One of the cooler things about working on A.I. is collaboration. Every now and then someone will e-mail someone else and say, "Hey – how 'bout we do something together for the next issue?" It's what makes A.I. what it is, essentially. Dave Huber began in A.I. by working with Jason Stephens. (Who was Jason? Check out last issue!) Dwayne Wilder began by working with Dave Huber. Bill Meiggs, Dave Huber and Allen Bujak all worked together on a project dubbed "Iron Curtain." Last issue, we saw the spectacular collaboration of Scott Brooks and Bill Meiggs. Collaboration is the foundation of this 'zine!!

Patrick Couture had e-mailed me for the first time years ago. We chatted every now and then about things Iron Man, and I really dug his IM-related website. Being a foreign language teacher, I was intrigued at the French-speaking Tony Stark featured on Pat's pages. More recently, close to about one year ago, I received an e-mail from Pat – he was in New Zealand! No wonder I hadn't heard from him in awhile, I thought. This guy gets around! But I thought he was from Montreal, Québec! Well, he is. He was in New Zealand with his fiancée, Rachel. Why was he there, though? Well, Rachel is from New Zealand! (That makes it easy, eh?) Pat was about to be married, and then he and his new bride would jet back to Canada to start wedded life together.

During the e-mails we were exchanging during this time, Pat expressed interest in getting involved with A.I. more. Talk about convenient timing! Then-Editor-in-Chief **Roger Ott** needed to go on hiatus due to his time-consuming additional schooling. *I* had given up that title for the same reason. But now I had more free time, and felt I

could reassume the EIC role now that Rog had to leave. Hey Pat! How would you like to be **Associate Editor??** ©

Thankfully, Pat accepted! And since then, Pat and I have worked diligently to make the "World-Wide" in our website title wholly appropriate. Between the two of us, we speak three languages (English, French and Spanish) and we have really worked to open up the doors to Iron Man fans across the globe – first by including French and Spanish versions of the A.I main page, but also by adding the A.I site to foreign language search engines! And now, thanks to German Iron Fan Holger Hinzberg, we now even have a German version of the A.I. main page! And witness the international contributions we have seen over the last few issues: Holger himself with his way-cool Iron Man art a couple issues ago, and French graphic artist Laurent Sebile whose awesome 3-D images graced our pages last issue!

Most recently, Patrick approached me with an idea of collaborating on "the best" of **Iron Man** – battles, storylines, characters, single issues, etc. Naturally, I agreed! And here is our first installment. We hope you like it.

BEST BATTLES OF IRON MAN

Every **Iron Fan** has his favorite **Iron Man** battle. In my view, **George Tuska** was the best artist when it came to depicting **Shellhead** beating the crap out of someone – or having the crap beat *out* of him. Certainly George wasn't the greatest *overall* artist to dibble on the **Golden Avenger's** pages. His regular characters could be among the cheesiest around (check out vol. 1 #10, page 2, panel 3 for just *one* example!), but then on the next page he could sketch some of the most beautiful comicbook women in the Marvel Universe (numerous examples abound, especially his **Marianne Rodgers**).

One of George's greatest battle issues was vol. 1 #49 – Iron Man vs. the Adaptoid. Beginning on page 6 and continuing through to the very end of the ish, IM and the A.I.M. creation go toe to toe with no clear victor! What makes George's IM appealing is that he *looks* tough. He *looks* like he can beat the tar out of anybody who gets in his way. I like to make the analogy to the actors who have played James Bond – my wife prefers Roger Moore while I prefer Sean Connery,

the original. Now just compare these two: Connery *looks* like he can kick arse, and he has the looks and suaveness to go along with it. On the other hand, Moore is a pretty-boy – he doesn't look like he could beat up Miss Moneypenney! Compare and contrast George's **Iron Man** to anyone else's. Tell me George's rendition doesn't look kick-arse!!

Some of George's other fine battle work can be found in #63-67 (Dr. Spectrum), #69-71 (Mandarin, Yellow Claw), #88-91 (Blood Brothers, Controller) and #95-100 (Ultimo, Mandarin).

What makes George's kick-arse style even *more* enticing – especially in the #60s and 70s – is the writing style of **Mike Friedrich**. Mike must've been a big fan of **Shellhead** because he always used upbeat, "rev-you-up" dialogue and commentary. Just glance at the last panel of **#71**: "After all, a long-standing sore has just been removed from Tony Stark's life...and the **IRON** can only get it on when the **MAN** inside is...together...and brother, now he's to-**GETHER!!**"

Iron Man #66 is another example. Look at Mike's page 18: "This is **power personified:** The greatest fighting machine ever made – yet powered inside by one of mankind's sharpest brains...truly the perfect wedding of flesh, blood, rivets and steel into one cause – and that is **power** – and that, friends, is **IRON MAN!**"



Many of these cool lines are illustrated by George's "signature pose." I'm not certain if this is really Tuska's signature pose, but I always refer to it as such since he sure uses it a lot! Iron Man tucks

himself into a sort of **fetal position** with arms tucked in and fists clenched, and then uses his back as a battering ram (which certainly makes sense as the back can take a lot of punishment). He seems to have "perfected" it later in his tenure as **IM** artist as you'll find it more in post-#50 issues. I picked a few issues from my collection at random and here's what I found: #66 has the pose no less than *three* times; #67 has it once; #71 has it twice and #88 and 89 feature it once each!

LIFE AFTER TUSKA

The next mainstay artists after George T. were – yep – John Romita Jr. and the legendary Bob Layton. I now say artists – plural – because Bob's inks were so definitive in making Iron Man truly "iron." John and Bob, in my view, do not have any real stand-out battle issues. Along with writer David Michelinie, this trio merely crafted some of the finest Shellhead yarns of all time – they didn't need to resort to all-out donneybrooks to weave a great story. So be it! Nevertheless, check out IM #s 127 (IM vs. Justin Hammer's

"Super Army"), #131-132 (vs. the Hulk), #135 (vs. the Titanium Man), #145 (vs. the Raiders) and #150 (vs. Doc Doom). Luke McDonnell was the next "permanent" artist on Iron Man. Luke was not a particularly competent artist for the Golden Avenger, especially with Steve Mitchell inking him (which was the case for most of Luke's tenure on the mag). He was definitely more appealing with Akin & Garvey on the brush chores, which took place very late in the McDonnell era, however. As for great McDonnell-Iron Man battles, I admit I

am hard-pressed to think of any off the top of my head! Probably the **Rhodey/IM vs. Mandarin** yarn (#179-181) would classify.

Also, the **Stark-Rhodes "Iron Man vs. Iron Man"** clash (#192) has to be included. Other than that, I wouldn't call any other scrap a "great" battle.

Enter: Mark Bright. Mark took over art chores on, of all issues, #200. And, as a result, this is his best battle issue! Stark, in his spankin' new Red and Silver Armor, takes on arch-nemesis **Obadiah Stane** in his Iron Monger armor. All-out iron action at its finest!! In Bright's first

issues, **Akin & Garvey** continued on inking duties, and they did an admirable job. Later on, of course, **Bob Layton** returned on ink brush (along with pal **David Michelinie** on scripts) to bring us the "**Armor Wars!**" (#225-232.)

POST #250 IRON MAN

No other steady artist on **Iron Man** really has enough issues to rate a separate section with the one exception – perhaps – of **Kevin Hopgood**. After the last Michelinie/Layton issue (#250), we had **John Romita Jr.** back (this time with Bob Wiacek on inks) on **"Armor Wars 2;" Paul Ryan** ("Demon Seed" saga); Kev Hopgood, along with the excellent **Len Kaminski** scripts; **Tom Morgan** (pre-"Crossing" issues); and lastly, scattered artists and inkers on the "Crossing" fiasco and Teen Tony miasma.

Let's take Hopgood first – the longest mainstay of the above. Kev was a captivating artist if he had the right inker. He had such with **Bob Wiacek** on the first **War Machine** issues (#281-283); however, when **Steve Mitchell** came back on brush (#290-306), Kev was less than optimal. Nevertheless, Kev gave us the War Mach issues, the **Hulk-Buster Armor** vs. the **Jade Giant, IM** vs. **Venom** and the **Iron Legion** against **Ultimo**.

Tom Morgan was awful. His characters were disjointed and awkward as a result of his hurried pencils and inks. Just scope *Iron Man #310* – IM vs. War Machine – especially where the Mandarin zaps in to nab the two. Yuck. He too, ruined a very cool Kaminski script where Stark journeys into cyberspace to take on the mad computer, VOR/TEX. Oh well.

HEROES REBORN

I would venture to say that many **Iron Fans** breathed a sigh of relief when "**Heroes Reborn**" debuted. After all, our hero was manipulated and killed, and then turned into a bratty teenager. But here we had an adult again, albeit a hardcore corporate head-hunter with seemingly little moral compass. The writers made this **Tony Stark/Iron Man** kick BUTT, and artists **Whilce Portacio** and Co. satisfied this. Whilce's figures are incredibly detailed, although his facial expressions need some refining.

HEROES RETURN

Sean who?? CHEN is his name. Very many of us did not know who Mr. Chen was aside from a little tidbit Bob Layton told A.I. a ways back that Sean would have been his and David Michelinie's choice for artist had they been given the book for "Return." Sean was certainly an excellent choice for IM – his characters are crisp and detailed, and his take on the armor was very Layton-esque. Unfortunately, too many of Kurt Busiek's scripts had Iron Man getting his butt handed to him rather than the reverse! But Sean obliged – and how – in the battle dept., especially with IM vs. Fin Fang Foom, War Machine III and Ultimo.

COUTURE'S FAVOURITES

Dave... you sure know your Iron Man.

All in all, I'd be hard-pressed to disagree with you. Aside maybe when it comes to **Tuska**. Now don't get me wrong, **I really dig Tuska**, not as much as you do, but I do like him. For me though, **the true Iron Man begins with Michelinie, Romita Jr and Layton.** Maybe it's because those were the first comics I ever got my hands on, I dunno... but to me, everything that came before that is like a footnote. I would be hard pressed to find a battle truly memorable out of these older issues (although your description of **that cool battering ram tactic** does make me want to dig out my old comics and go have another look).

So for me, Iron Man's greatest battles will have to be post-issue 115.

I've always seen the history of Iron Man as one with **four important** and **distinct highlights**. Three periods of pure masterpieces. I like to call them the **Age of Gold**, the **Age of Silver**, the **Age of Bronze** and **La Renaissance**. And since I don't want to simply repeat everything Dave has just said, I'll try to narrow it down to **ONE great battle per period.** Think I can do it? I'm not sure either! ©

The Age of Gold

You guessed it, I'm talking about Iron Man #115 to #153.

Out of that truly brilliant period comes **one battle** that, in my opinion, **tops all the others from any period hands down**. It is truly what I consider to be **the one single greatest Iron Man battle of all times**. **Iron Man #132**: the Golden Avenger versus **THE HULK**. Give that issue to any kid on the face of the Earth and he or she is going to be hooked on Iron Man forever. Heck, that's what happened to me! \odot

What do I like so much about that one? **Try everything**. First of all, the art is absolutely brilliant. And no, **JRJ** wasn't on pencils at that moment, it was a guy called **Jerry Bingham** (who is he anyway? What else did he do? Why was his stay on IM so short? Does anyone know?) Whoever he was, his **beautiful art** enhanced by **Layton**'s **legendary inking** gave us **extraordinary results**. **Stark** looks great, **Beth** looks great, **the Hulk** looks great and well... **Iron Man** looks amazing.

The **mother of all battles** takes place in the worst possible location, smack in the middle of **Stark**'s company, with lots of innocent bystanders around (as if the pressure of single-handedly fighting the Hulk wasn't enough). And it's **one hell of a fight**. The Hulk is the **strongest and most powerful** being on the face of the Earth, so **Iron Man gets thrown around like a rag doll** for about 6 pages. Never before or since have I seen Stark throw **everything he's got** at something like that. The two of them trash the place. This is one particular adversary that **Stark** can't try to outsmart. When it comes to **the Hulk**, it's all about **raw power**.

All that his efforts have accomplished is making the **Hulk** dizzy. Then on **page 26**, **Iron Man** tenses up, clenches his fists, channels all his power in one single earth-shaking punch that completely drains the Avenger's armor of all its energy. **Those pages have an intensity that has remained unmatched in any other Shellhead battle.** Thanks to **Michelinie**'s narrative, the suspense is so heavy **I hold my breath every time I read it.** The final punch is so powerful, I almost feel the ground shake, **it barely fits in an entire page**. Now that's what I call a masterpiece.

The Age of Silver

An aptly named age because it features **a new look for Iron Man**; the **Silver Centurion armor**. This second period of greatness extends from **IM #200 to #232**. **Michelinie and Layton** are back with a truly amazing penciler, **Mark Bright**.



My favorite battle out of that period would have to be the one that takes place all through issues **219 to 221**. Three issues, three rounds in a fight that pits IM to a guy that is **just about impossible to defeat**, a saboteur that can turn invisible or intangible at will... **the Ghost!**

Round one: IM chases the Ghost through Accutech, punching his way through numerous walls to follow the intangible menace. All he throws at him passes right through him. In the end, what does he get for his efforts? A bomb blown up in his face

and a deadly threat. **Round two:** never have I seen Stark so helpless, so defenseless. Reduced to sleeping in his armor to **protect himself** from an enemy who can walk through a wall at any time, Stark is scared... yes, **scared.** That doesn't happen too often. The only thing that saves him is **Spymaster**'s interference, but the ruthless Ghost quickly eliminates that annoyance, killing him even. As for **IM**, he is forced to put on this old armor that he swore never to wear again, an armor that brings back so much bitter memories. **Round three:** how do you beat a guy you can't even touch? The answer is simple, really: you outsmart him. Stark sets a trap but what truly defeats the Ghost in the end is his own obsession. IM never even manages to even lay a finger on him.

In the end, isn't it what often makes a battle truly great? When the possibility of defeat becomes overwhelming, when winning **becomes unlikely?** And then the surprise ending when the hero finds a way to come out on top.

he Age of Bronze

I'm talking about **IM #280 to #306**. Out of that third great period, brought to us mainly thanks to the writing talents of Len Kaminski, comes another amazing battle. I'm talking about issues 282-283. The first appearance of the War Machine armor used by Stark to go after the Masters of Silence and his ultimate nemesis, Justin Hammer.

This battle is great for very different reasons than the two previous ones. Stark is hurt, he's dying, he's



up by the Mandarin, Fin Fang Foom, the entire Kree empire and the Stark barbarians from the future... he's not going to take anymore.

After designing his **new kick-arse WM armor**, **Iron Man** endeavors give the MOS a crushing defeat they won't soon forget and then to

systematically take Justin Hammer apart bit by bit. No more mister nice guy, the kid gloves are off, and Hammer is going to get one rude awakening. What an awesome battle... Iron Man unchained, unhinged, not holding back for once but rather giving the bad guys everything he's got. And man, do they ever get it. Every panel erupts with raw power, every line makes you smile with satisfaction... this is what wearing an invincible armor is all about. Great stuff.

La Renaissance

This of course is the **Busiek-Chen era**, stretching from **IM volume 3 #1 to #25**. Two years of well-deserved bliss, after all the crap we had to endure before. Sure, **Heroes Reborn was cool** (especially after the Crossing). It was a fun series. **But that guy was not my Iron Man**. To me, that was some sort of alternate reality, an interlude until the real thing was to be brought back. And he thankfully was.

The best battle to come out of that fourth era of greatness would have to be the one pitting the Golden Avenger against Ultimo. I hesitated quite a bit before choosing this one, because I really loved the titanic clash between IM and Fin Fang Foom. But the Ultimo fight came out on top for one single reason: I never saw the end coming. Til the last minute, I kept asking myself "How the heck is he going to defeat that thing this time?" Iron Man had one heck of a fight on his hands, and I loved every second of it. I will not delve further into it because all of you have read it not so long ago so you know very well what I'm talking about.

So there you go, that's my grain of salt, Hube. **Four periods, four great battles...** they said it couldn't be done but I somehow managed to do it \odot . Now I gotta go and put all those comics back in their bags and boxes... look what you made me do \odot .

Now For part two of our very special AND exclusive interview with current Iron-scribe Frank Tieri & Iron Editor Bobbie Chase. Without further adIEU...

Under the Helmet with Frank Tieri & Bobbie Chase:

- CF- Bobbie, what titles do you currently oversee?
- BC- Captain America, Fantastic Four, and Iron Man are my 3 monthly titles. I also have lots of other special limited series and bookshelf comics (graphic novels) in the works.
- **CF- And how long have you been affiliated with Shellhead?**
- **BC-** Since the beginning of volume 3 -- we started working on it full-force in the middle of 1997.
- CF- Frank, You're partnered with Sean Chen on Wolverine, a character about as diametrically opposed to Tony/Shellhead as is possible. How will your approach be different for writing these two characters?
- FT- I approach the two books in the way that I think they work best -- what works for one won't necessarily work for the other. For Wolverine, it's like Dirty Harry meets Lethal Weapon his fans like their Wolvie grim and gritty with plenty of violence and mystery. That sure wouldn't work with Iron Man. He's more Howard Hughes meets James Bond and more inclined to find himself in high levels of corporate intrigue, with the

latest state of the art technology and a good dose of the lovely ladies to keep him company.

CF- Any plans for a crossover between the two?

FT- Let's put it this way—it has been discussed. So I'll say a definite maybe. However, I will say this -- I'll only do it if it makes sense. I hate crossovers or guest appearances when people just pop up for no particular reason. It has to be a story that works for both characters, otherwise I'd rather just pass.

CF- In Frank Tieri's version, who takes who down? How?

FT- Actually, I could come up with scenarios where either one could take down the other. Wolverine, using hit and run tactics, picking Iron Man off piece by piece. Iron Man, from up high, using his vast arsenal to rain down on Wolverine.

So I'd say, the winner is... What are you guys trying to get me in trouble? If I pick one, the fans of the loser will grill me to no end! No thanks, fellas, I'll take the fifth on this one.

CF- Other than new armor this summer, any other tantalizing tidbits you can share exclusively with A.I. readers?

FT- Well, like you said, probably the big deal this summer will be the new armor -- but it's the way that we're putting it together that's really unique. We're talking about having fans involved in the process only we're still trying to figure out what the best way to do that is as we speak. So stay tuned.

As far as what's coming up, expect the unexpected – I like surprises and I've got a couple of doozies waiting in the wings. Some old villains will get a revamp, some new elements will be introduced, some old elements will be brought back – all in all, it should be a fun ride

CF- Bobbie, we've heard some of the things Frank has "planned," but how, exactly, do you interface with the creative process? I mean, we see your name on the letters page and in the credits but what does an editor at Marvel do?

BC- Oh, Lordy -- have you got a while? Feel free to edit this!

An Editor's first responsibility is to his or her regular monthly titles, in hiring the team of 5 that gets on every book -- writer, penciler, inker, colorist, letterer. We work with the writer in developing the long-term story line -- usually at least a 6 month timeline -- then we edit the plot, and send it along to the penciler, and from there we keep the work flowing along smoothly. We receive and send all work to and from the artists, making corrections as we go along, if the work needs it. We proof the scripts and final lettered books, make any art or coloring corrections that need to be made. We write the solicit material so the books can be put into the catalogue and advertised.

We work with the separators and printers, and work with the production department and designers in compositing the books and designing the covers and interior pages. We write or edit the letters pages (or the Assistant Editors write them), deal with Promotions and Advertising and Licensing and the press (people like you) as the need arises, negotiate page rates for creators, keep track of all deadlines and trafficking.

We act as "character cops" for characters in our domain, in cooperating with other editors to maintain character consistency in the Marvel Universe. We create and develop new projects, and generally act as talent scouts for the company and PR people for our own books.

And we do this with about 5-7 projects per Editor per month. Other than that it's a lot of clerical work, and spending time on the phone talking to the creators, and attending the occasional annoying meetings. I'm also currently running an "Editors School" program with Tom Brevoort, where we meet with the whole editorial staff once a week and discuss the craft. I'm forgetting important stuff, I'm sure.

CF- There you have it fellow Ferrophiles... straight from the man with Shellhead's plan. Thanks Frank. Thanks Bobbie.

Well Ferrophiles, that does it for me in this issue. Hope you enjoyed this issue of Ferro-Files.



I'll begin with a couple of "Stark Wars" ("Armor Wars I") points of interest, continuing my comments begun in **A.I. 50** concerning the relationship between Captain America's shield and Tony Stark. As all Iron Fans know, Tony created a new shield for **Steve Rogers** -**The Captain** – during the "Stark Wars." Following an incident at **The Vault**, Tony and Steve had a severe falling out, one which literally comes to blows in **CAPTAIN AMERICA** #341! So what happens? I ain't saying! But even before the action in CAP #341, The Captain teams up with our favorite thunder god in **THOR #390.** Goldilocks drops his hammer and guess which little shield-slinger -- who is slinging the Stark-created shield -- picks it up!





Scott Lang, a.k.a.

the **Astonishing Ant-Man**, has played an important role in both runs of **IRON MAN** by **David Michelinie and Bob Layton**. David was gracious enough to answer a few questions concerning the diminutive dynamo.

But first, a very brief rundown of some key **Iron Man**-related appearances
of Scott Lang as **Ant-Man**...

Scott Lang first appeared as a character and as employee of Stark International in *AVENGERS*#181 (March 1979), "On the Matter of Heroes."
Lang's introduction to Marvel readers lasted exactly three panels, as he installed a new security system

inside **Avengers Mansion**... which was promptly destroyed by **Wonder Man** and the **Beast**. Story by David Michelinie. Artwork by John Byrne and Gene Day (inker not specified).



A month later in MARVEL PREMIERE: FEATURING THE ASTONISHING ANT-MAN #47 (April 1979), "To Steal an Ant-Man!," he made his first full appearances as both Scott Lang -- single father,


electronics expert, and ex-con -- and as Ant-Man. Lang's young daughter Cassie became the springboard for his becoming a superhero, upon needing specialized heart surgery which requires a special technique developed by Dr. Erica Sondheim. Unable to secure the services of Dr. Sondheim, Lang learns that she is being held against her will in the Long Island city headquarters of Cross Technological Enterprises. Using the cat burglar skills of his past "career" and applying his knowledge of security systems, he easily gains access to the CTE HQ and accidentally discovers the lab of **Henry Pym,** an employee of CTE, and Pym's stowed **Ant-Man costume.** During the action that follows in this issue and in the next, #48 -- "The Price of a Heart!," Lang capably uses the cybernetic helmet and Pym shrinking gas. Lang is afterwards congratulated by Hank Pym, in the guise of Yellowjacket, who had witnessed the ordeal. With his blessings, Pym allows Lang to keep the uniform and urges him to carry on as the new Ant-Man. Story by David Michelinie. Artwork in both issues by John Byrne and Bob Layton (inker not specified).

In *IRON MAN #125* (August 1979), "The Monaco Prelude," Tony Stark enlists the aid of Lang/Ant-Man in securing information on the whereabouts of Justin Hammer, who somehow had gotten control of Tony's armor and caused a repulsor to "misfire," resulting in the death of a Carnelian ambassador. Plot and script by David Michelinie; pencil art by John Romita, Jr.; and finished art & plot by Bob Layton.



"Iron Man has finally beaten the Hulk -- but at what cost?" touts the cover blurb of IRON MAN #133 (April 1980), "The Hero Within!," which is the third installment of a terrific story arc. Bob Layton artwork depicts both


Iron Man and the **Hulk** seemingly down for the count. To end a titanic tussle with ol' Greenskin at the end of issue #132, **Iron Man** channeled all



available power from his armor into one, off-the-charts-powerful punch, which not only felled the Hulk but also created a massive systems failure in the tin tux, trapping Tony inside. Now in issue #133, it's Scott Lang -- Ant-Man -- to the

Thomas wherein Hank Pym as Ant-Man enters the body of the **Vision** to reboot his android systems, Lang similarly and successfully works the same magic with **Iron Man's armor.** Plot and script by David Michelinie, layouts by Jerry Bingham, and plot & finished art by Bob Layton.

To temporarily defeat the **Taskmaster** in **MARVEL TEAM-UP #103** (March



1981), "The Assassin Academy,"
Scott Lang/Ant-Man tries a trick with the shrink/enlarge gas that Hank Pym never did --he enlarges something other than the intended user. In



this case, **an ant! Spider-Man** co-stars in this little soiree. Story by David Michelinie, pencils by Jerry Bingham, and inks by Mike Esposito.

Tony Stark moves to California and creates **Stark Enterprises.** Scott Lang moves to California and starts up **ElectroLang**, **Inc.** After Tony learns that **Justin Hammer** somehow has stolen his proprietary armor technology, he intends to find out just exactly who received the stolen property by hacking into Hammer's database with the help of computer expert **Abe Zimmer**... and Scott

Lang, who as Ant-Man is required to physically enter Hammer's computer and flip a data input/output switch that will allow Zimmer to extract the needed information. Thus begins the first chapter of "Stark Wars," possibly the most important and all-time Iron-Fan-favorite storyline, in IRON MAN #225 (December 1987). Plot and script by David Michelinie, breakdowns by Mark Bright, and plot & finished artwork by Bob Layton.



In the first full post-"Stark Wars" story, IRON MAN #233 (August 1988), "Slaughterday," the public's grand introduction to the allnew Iron Man is almost scuttled by a band of light-armored baddies. Luckily, Scott Lang, who is on hand to help with the technological end of the demonstration, notices something suspicious and ultimately

stops the attempt as Ant-Man. Lang again uses the shrink/enlarge gas on a non-primary user by shrinking one of the attackers while still inside of his armor. Plot and script by David Michelinie, layouts by Jackson Guice, and plot & finished artwork by Bob Layton.

After **Reed Richards** and **Doctor Doom** apparently perish in the pages of **FANTASTIC FOUR #381**, Sue Richards contacts Tony Stark for tech support. Tony immediately recommends Scott Lang, who is "hired" on the spot. Needless to say, **Ant-Man joins the FF!** Lang holds his own in the role of a substitute superhero and as an in-awe electronics technician -- the equipment in the lab of Reed Richards would drop anyone's jaw.

Arrogant thirteen-year-old **Kristoff Vernhard** possesses all of the knowledge and experiences of **Doctor Doom.** Kristoff has allied himself with the FF in an attempt to search for Doom. The youngster's contempt for Scott Lang is as deep as his affection for Lang's daughter Cassie. Interestingly, Kristoff designed a **new Ant-Man uniform** for Lang which debuts in **FANTASTIC FOUR #405** (October 1995), **"Terror is Tomorrow!"** The helmet has plexiglass "bug eyes"; built-in antennas; and sidemounted, mandible-like microphones -- appliances



which will be featured in similar headgear worn by the future adult Cassie Lang who will adopt the identity of **Stinger**, a founding member of **A-Next** (Avengers-Next). Script and plot by Tom DeFalco, pencils and plot by Paul

Ryan, and inks by Dan Bulandi.

The original Ant-Man, Hank Pym, took a "fantastic voyage" into the synthetic innards of the **Vision**, who once was thought to be the original **Human Torch** -- ironically, the current leader of **Heroes for Hire**, in the guise of **Jim Hammond**, an artificial man with some "tummy trouble" of his own. Down the hatch to administer some internal medicine goes Scott Lang, clad in his classic Ant-Man ensemble, in *HEROES FOR HIRE #13* (July 1998), **"Fallout."** Note: **Mrs. Arbogast** -- a classic Michelinie-created supporting character in **IRON MAN** -- helps run the day-to-day

administrative activities of Heroes for Hire! Story by John Ostrander, pencils by Martin Egeland, and inks by Hector Collazo.

Scott Lang's third full-fledged "inside job" occurs in *A-NEXT #8* (May 1999), "Into the Depths!," as he and Stinger (daughter Cassie) miniaturize and head into the robotic body of Mainframe, a Tony Stark-created automaton built in





the image of **Iron Man**, to manually release a self-repair module. Once again Lang dons his Kristoff-created Ant-Man suit. *Plot and story by Tom DeFalco, plot and pencils by Ron Frenz, and finished art by Al Milgrom.*

Presently, Scott Lang is back FFing, as of FANTASTIC FOUR (Vol. 3) #42

(June 2001), "A Clear & Present Danger." Lang receives an emergency call to help Johnny Storm contain a rampaging **Sub-Mariner**. Arriving in time to assist the **She-Hulk**, who had also been

contacted, Ant-Man, wearing an updated version of his classic costume, which includes newly-designed

stingers, delivers a zap to Namor's inner ear which renders the sea prince unconscious. *Plot by Carlos Pacheco and Rafael Marin, script by Jeph Loeb, pencils by Stuart Immonen, and inks by Jesus Merino.*

KALIBABKY: Did you originally set out to create Scott Lang as just a new, but un-superheroic, supporting character for **AVENGERS** and **IRON MAN?**

MICHELINIE: No, Scott was intended to be the new **Ant-Man** from the start. His debut in **AVENGERS** was a matter of design. One of the things I loved about Marvel Comics was the unified nature of the Marvel Universe. Everything seemed to be a part of the same world, rather than the Metropolis world of Superman, the Central City world of the Flash, the Gotham City world of Batman, etc. Part of that unity was accomplished by seeing characters from different series crossing over in an almost casual manner, not necessarily guest-starring but just being there. Putting Scott into the Avengers as a Stark International employee was an example of that.

KALIBABKY: Of all the "doppelganger" superhero characters you could have created, why another **Ant-Man**, a second-tier character at best? What's your fascination with Ant-Man?

MICHELINIE: Actually, one of the main reasons I created a new **Ant-Man** was because he *was* a second-string character. Nobody was using the character at the time, and nobody seemed to have any particular interest in it. So that gave me a lot of freedom to do what I wanted -- to try to come up with something new and interesting without having a lot of people looking over my shoulder and saying, "You can't do that!" As for a fascination with Ant-Man, that really wasn't the case. I had liked **The Atom** over at DC, but hadn't really read Ant-Man stories before starting to work for Marvel. It was really the Scott Lang character I was interested in; the costume, name and powers were just trappings.

KALIBABKY: Where did the idea for the character of **Cassie Lang** come from?

MICHELINIE: At the time, there weren't many (any?) single parent super heroes at Marvel. I thought that would be a great angle to explore. I mean, think of it: you're ten years old, your Dad's a genuine, honest-to-gosh super hero -- and you can't tell anyone! Imagine the unbearable temptation when someone on the playground says, "My dad can beat up your dad!"

KALIBABKY: When Scott debuted as the new Ant-Man, Hank Pym was flitting around as **Yellowjacket**. Did you worry about having two small, insect-monikered and like-powered heroes in the Marvel Universe at the same time?

MICHELINIE: No. Like I said, my major interest was in Scott Lang, who was a vastly different human being from Hank Pym. As long as the focus remained on the person rather than the powers, I didn't think surface similarities were that important.

KALIBABKY: Lang used Pym's shrink/enlarge gas to once enlarge an ant, but never used it on himself to become **Giant-Man II.** Any reason why he felt perfectly content as Ant-Man?

MICHELINIE: I don't think it was so much a case of Scott being content as Ant-Man, as it was of me not thinking of that possibility! I tried to play Scott as new at heroing, experiencing everything with excitement and an almost childlike sense of wonder -- an example being the thrill and terror he felt when flying on an ant for the first time, relative "miles" above the ground. Seeing how he'd react to being a giant would probably have made for a cool story. If it had occurred to me. (sigh)

KALIBABKY: During "Stark Wars" ("Armor Wars" I) Lang/Ant-Man made one brief appearance -- to help Tony Stark obtain information from Justin Hammer's database. Did you originally plan to use Ant-Man again during the storyline?

MICHELINIE: No, that was just another case of inserting Marvel characters -- especially those without their own series -- into stories wherever you found an opportunity to do so.

KALIBABKY: Did you, or Tony Stark, ever consider a new Ant-Man costume or armor for Lang? Any reason why Lang didn't make any enhancements to the costume himself? Comments on the one created by Kristoff Vernhard?

MICHELINIE: I usually revamp a costume or armor only when there seems to be a need for it, something that's dictated by a story or storyline. I liked the original costume, and there didn't seem to be any good reason to change it. As far as enhancements go, Ant-Man was a supporting character whose appearances were limited; generally he just played a part in the ongoing plots that centered around the main characters. This frequently dictated what I was able to do or not do with him. Had he been in his on ongoing series, with more time for subplots and character bits, I'm sure he would have indulged in quite a bit of tinkering -- which would undoubtedly have led to some fun stories! As for the Kristoff Vernhard design, I haven't read those stories so can't comment on them.

KALIBABKY: Delightful Cassie Lang is terrific comic relief. Did the thought ever cross your mind to use her in a short solo "adventure" of her own, say in an annual or something?

MICHELINIE: Again, there were the limitations of Ant-Man playing only a

supporting roll. I did a solo **Jarvis** story when I was writing **THE AVENGERS**, and a **J. Jonah Jameson** story when I was writing **AMAZING SPIDER-MAN**. But convincing Marvel to give me space for a story about a supporting character for a "supporting character" was a bit much to hope for!

KALIBABKY: After Cassie's heart surgery in **MARVEL PREMIERE #48**, there was never any follow-up on her condition. Or was there? Cassie's heart problem was the reason her dad became Ant-Man.

MICHELINIE: I didn't do any follow-up; I don't know if someone else did. This, again, was in large part a result of Ant-Man not having his own series. Since he was generally put into other characters' plotlines, having something major going on in his own life -- like a daughter with a heart problem -- would have been difficult to fit in.

KALIBABKY: Do you keep up at all with the goings-on of your characters, such as Scott Lang/Ant-Man or **Mrs. Arbogast**, once they fall into the pages of other books? As an aside, both Scott and Cassie Lang are alive and well; Scott appears to be an ongoing guest star in **FANTASTIC FOUR**, while Cassie, as **Stinger**, shows up from time to time in **SPIDER-GIRL**. Stinger, by the way, has her own action figure -- its special power is tipping over!

MICHELINIE: To be honest, I generally make an effort to *not* follow a character that I've created or developed once I've lost control of them. Seeing what happens to characters I care about when other people write them is almost always painful; even if a new take on the character is brilliant, it's never what I would have done myself, and that's inevitably frustrating. I don't condemn other writers for putting their own stamp on a character; once a character is out from under the protection of a creator or an editor, it's fair game. I've revamped characters (and likely pissed off other writers) myself. But accepting and enjoying are two different things, so I usually avoid reading stories featuring "my guys" once they leave the fold.

KALIBABKY: Is there anything you wanted to accomplish with Ant-Man or Scott Lang that you didn't get to do while you were writing **IRON MAN?**

MICHELINIE: There was one big plan that co-plotter **Bob Layton** and I had set up that we never got to follow through on. In the Ant-Man origin story in **PREMIERE**, it was mentioned that Scott's wife -- Cassie's mom -- had disappeared while he was in prison. Her name was established as "Rae." In the later issues of our second run on **IRON MAN**, we gave Tony Stark a new girlfriend, the wealthy owner of a posh styling boutique. Her name was "Rae LaCoste." That's right, we were building up to a point where Tony would introduce his new squeeze to his friend Scott, only to find that she's Scott's vanished wife! That would have lead to a story where we explained why she had disappeared, and what her real reasons were for being in California. I think the situation would have made for some very juicy character stuff,

exploring how this revelation would have affected everyone involved: Tony, Rae, Scott... and especially Cassie.

KALIBABKY: Do you feel proud at all for having created the Langs?

MICHELINIE: I don't know if "proud" is quite the right word. Perhaps "pleased" would be better. I like Scott & Cassie a bunch, and wish I could have written more stories about them, developed their personalities further. But I think they're good, entertaining characters, and I'm happy with what I was able to do with them.

KALIBABKY: "Thanks to help from a little friend," is how Ant-Man describes his successful effort to free Tony Stark from his **Iron Man** armor in **IRON MAN #133.** The remark makes me wonder... are you a Beatles fan?

MICHELINIE: To quote the Vice President Of The United States: "Big time!"











Bonjour! Are you one of these people who can't get enough of Iron Man? The regular series, the Avengers and all the back issues aren't enough for ya? Want to know where you can get an extra fix? If so, then my humble column dedicated to **Iron Man's numerous apparitions as a guest-star** is for you!

Do you guys remember the "Marvel Comics Presents" series that began in 1988 and lasted several years? Every bi-monthly issue would feature **four stories** of about 8 pages and each one of them was about a **different hero**. Iron Man was featured in the pages of MCP on several occasions over the years and that's what I'll be looking at this time around. His first three guest-stars in MCP were in issues **8**, **43** and **51**.

Strapping on the enormous reactors he used once before during the Armor Wars to reach Russia, Iron Man heads for Asia as quickly as he can. After ruthlessly attacking the red army, he reaches the place of the execution... only a second too late. He takes a body in his arms and heads for the outside of the city where the mortally wounded man tells him: "Tell Tony... good bye for me, I'm glad he got out earlier... the safer way..."

A MINORITY POINT OF VIEW By Brad Lyons

This article is in response to all of the negative reviews concerning the current state of the **Iron Man** monthly as seen in the infamous **RUST** website, various message boards, and **Iron Filings**. These complaints are primarily coming from the long term fans, which I will refer to as "veterans" which is a tad more fitting than "old farts." I am not arguing the opinions of veteran **Iron Man** fans, which are respected, but instead I'd like to give a different perspective from a member of the younger **IM** generation. "Younger **IM** generation" does not necessarily refer to actual age, but to the era in which comic books were first read and collected.

HISTORY (If you could care less about my **IM** history, skip down to the next section.)

My first encounter with **Iron Man** was back in the mid seventies when I was about 3 or 4. The neighbor kid had an awesome playroom, so that's where I spent a lot of my time. At the back of the playroom closet, there were 3 boxes full of comics with a large number of **Iron Man**. Now, being only 3 or 4 years old, I'm sure you can imagine how well we treated them. Now that I think about it, some of those could have been **Tales of Suspense**, because I remember seeing **Captain America** as well. I recently spoke to my neighbor's father, and he told me he still has those boxes!! (What I wouldn't give to get my hands on those! – but that's another story.) We couldn't read them, so we just looked at the pictures. The superhero that stood out for me was, of course, **Iron Man**. He had the coolest costume, and no matter how bad he was getting beat up, he'd always come back to win.

That's about all she wrote for me and comic books up until 1996. I was in boot camp at the age of 22 (don't ask), and towards the end of my little 9-week getaway, we had some free time to do whatever inside the barracks. One of my fellow recruits was reading some comic books he bought at the NEX and I was bored out of my mind, so I thought what the heck? I believe it was *X-Men #53*, a build-up story to the **Onslaught** epic - and what do you know? - this was good stuff! I thoroughly enjoyed every bit of it! As soon as I reached my next duty station, remembering my fondness of **Iron Man** in my childhood, I ran out and bought the newest issue of **IM**. It was #329

- smack dab in the middle of the Teenage Tony Stark saga. Thus began my quest for everything **Iron Man** under the sun!

WHERE I'M COMING FROM

Forget everything you know about **Iron Man** – forget every villain he's faced – forget he's an alcoholic – forget he owns (or owned) SE and SI – forget he has a bad heart – forget his origin – forget every supporting cast member he's ever had – forget he died and was replaced by a younger version of himself – forget he's an Avenger – forget every writer and penciler who has ever graced his pages – forget everything.

Now that you've done that, I'll tell you what you do know: You know that **Iron Man's** true identity is Tony Stark. You know that Tony Stark has a moustache. You know that Tony Stark is rich. Most importantly, you know that **Iron Man** is your favorite superhero. That's it. That's all you know.......good. Now that we're on the same page, let me share some positive points about what the majority feels is wrong with recent **Iron Man** issues.

Let's start off nice and easy with "Teen" **Iron Man.** This being my first dose of **IM** (that I actually read) I thought it was really good. The comic book medium was totally new to me and I loved every page. When I read the letters page, I couldn't believe how many people were complaining about it (this still happens today). However, having collected and read only a few back issues, I began to see why it was disliked. 'Nuff said.

The **Heroes Reborn** is still my favorite to date, including the armor. Seeing for the first time the origin of not one, but two superheroes was absolutely fascinating. The art and color was 10 times better than anything I'd seen before. The abstract page layouts were outstanding, and the plots were unbelievable (unbelievable in a good way). I had no idea a comic book could be this good. My copy of *IM #1 vol. 2* is in terrible condition because I've read it so many times. All the issues in *IM HR* were way ahead of their time (save #12 and 13).

Most people seem to like **IM vol. 3 #1-25**, so I'll skip over these.

As for **Joe Quesada's Sentient Armor**, well, anyone who didn't love that saga can take a long walk off a short cliff. What more could you want? A high flying battle in a lightning-filled sky, the birth of the **Sentient Armor**, the death of **Whiplash**, the return of the **Modular**

Armor, Tony Stark in a primal rage, a new sentient heart – beautiful. Although I must say, I agree it didn't make any sense that Tony would leave the armor buried on an island. But let's face it, this isn't the same **Iron Man** from the **Armor Wars.** He's been through a lot of changes since then. He's been brainwashed, killed, replaced, whisked off to another dimension, whisked back, he's started a new business, and even fell in love. I realize these events are everything veterans loathe, but the fact still remains, he's not the same.

Alitha Martinez – I don't think I've read a positive comment from anyone concerning her art. I'll admit, I was very disappointed when **Sean Chen** left. I did not like the first issue by Martinez, mainly because I had become accustomed to Chen's style. But after only another issue or two, her style started to grow on me. I've heard people say that she improving with each issue. Well, I got news for 'ya – each issue is basically the same. These people are just afraid to admit that she's growing on them as well. I've also seen Martinez's pencils be described as "Manga." Call it what you like, but I think she is an outstanding artist. Take a look at anything over 10 years ago. You're off your rocker if think the art was better back then. Sure, a lot of it has to do with the colors, but today's art is just so much better. If you don't believe me, take a look at **IM #40**, where old and new are side by side. Those guys ain't got nuthin' on Martinez!

And finally, I've also noticed **Frank Tieri** taking a verbal beating from almost every **IM** veteran. O.K. I see some reasons why he isn't well received, but the negative responses are overwhelming. **The Sons of Yinsen** collaboration was an exciting, high-action, well-written story. However, if you want to get philosophical and analyze past the surface, (which is not always a good idea concerning comics) maybe trudging up **IM's** origin wasn't what veteran fans needed. If you look back, making the **Mandarin** responsible for **IM's** origin instead of **Wong Chu**, and Wong Chu surviving the explosion (ish #s 266-268) was in the same ballpark as this.

The **Classic Armor** comeback I definitely loved because I was not around when Tony originally wore this suit. I've heard people say (I'm paraphrasing) "this was a cheap attempt to make die-hards happy" or "tried to connect new readers with **IM's** past." Whatever! Call me cheap or easily amused, but I thought it was cool.

Max Power was also an excellent story. This Max Power guy had a lot of potential. It was too bad he was tied into "Maximum Security." The only good thing that came out of "Max Sec" was that U.S. Agent

had a huge comeback. (Oops! Was that a negative comment?) Sure there was a touch of cheesiness to the Max Power story, but if you can't take a little bit of cheese, maybe you're too mature to read comics to begin with. Instead of subscribing to **IM** monthly, maybe you should switch to *The Wall Street Journal*.

I haven't seen hardly any reviews on the underwater filler. I guess no review is a good review. I enjoyed this one as well, but let me just say one word – Leviathan. The "Remote Control" saga was also an outstanding tale. It introduced what could be a very deadly business rival, **Tiberius Stone**, replacing **Stane** and **Hammer**. No one has even come close to these scoundrels. **Trevor Donohue** had potential, but now he's dying and even helped Stark. **Sunset Bain** is dangerous but is also attracted to Stark, which makes her not-so-dangerous. The possibilities for Ty Stone are endless. Back to the story – let's just say that at the end of each issue I was excited and anxious and giddy like a little school-girl, just waiting for the next issue. Any writer who can do that is Grade-A in my book.

Now that that's off my chest, I don't want anyone to get me wrong. I have read many-many-many back issues and absolutely loved 'em. I have almost every ish from #200 on, with only a few holes, and probably 25 or so from before that. I'm not exactly what you'd call an Iron Man expert, but I'm not that far behind. I've seen all the cries for a Michelinie/Layton return. I've read their issues and yes, they are some of the best (the Ghost is my all-time favorite villain). I would not at all oppose Michelinie's return to IM. Actually I would welcome it, but only after Tieri's run is finished. However, Layton is no longer in his prime. Bad Blood was good and I'd give the pencils a 6.5 on a scale of 1 to 10, but I think his time has past as a headlining penciler. Colors – sure, pencils – nah. There are too many gifted artists to choose from that can hang with the industry's finest.

All in all, I'd say the recent issues of **IM** are just as good - if not better - than anything prior. I know, I know...I am in the minority, but maybe this article will give others who share my point of view the *cojones* to send in their opinions who may otherwise be intimidated to oppose the veteran majority view. I know I was for the longest time.

And so, for all of you disgruntled **Iron Man** veterans who are displeased with the current state of **Iron Man**, especially the creator of [the website] RUST-----IT SUCKS TO BE YOU!!!! Maybe "Carousel" (from Logan's Run) wasn't such a bad concept.

Down on the street Blizzard says to his companions "Look guys. While it may be fun to play with the cops, we should beat it. We've made a nice haul here, and the new gear tests out." Boomerang chuckles and says "yeah but the real test is arriving now" and points up the arriving Iron man! "Oh boy!" blacklash whispers nervously. Iron Man faces the three and says "okay guys. Nice and easy now, give it up before anyone gets hurt!" Blacklash laughs and sends his whip in an attack towards the Golden Avenger. Iron Man easily catches the whip but is shocked literally by a constantly modulated electric charge sent into the whip! Before Iron Man can recover, the Blizzard encases him up to his helmet in solid ice as Boomerang lets fly a sonic screaming boomerang. "Blast!" Tony thinks "I severely underestimated these guys. Clearly the two

rookies have trained and Boomerang never was a lightweight. Still..." Diverting his energy to his strength circuits Iron Man easily shatters the ice, a fragment of which knocks out the boomerang attack, and sends a double repulsor blast forth that stuns Blizzard. Blacklash tries his whip again but Iron Man quickly sets up a reverse magnetic field to repel the whip's attack from hitting him and a repulsor blast fells Blacklash. Iron Man then faces Boomerang. "Give up Boomerang. You can't win this!" Boomerang quickly looks around at the police and at Iron Man and raises his hands in surrender. Moving quickly, Iron Man disarms Boomerang and Blacklash and removes Blizzards gauntlets since they were what radiated the cold attacks. The police take the criminals away as Iron Man waves to the cheering crowd, who if they could see underneath the helmet, would see the frown on Iron Man's face. "Those two rookies and even Boomerang seemed stronger then before. My sensors indicated that Blizzard's cold attack was more intense then before and Blacklash's whip has definitely never done that before. I need to study these weapons. Perhaps I can incorporate some new ideas into the new suit." Iron Man waves to the crowd once last time and jets off still concerned.

Scene shift: A palatial chamber where a figure sits in shadow with his hands clasped. A glint of light reflects of a ring on one of his fingers as he studies a report. "So those three surrendered to the police after Iron Man bested them. Good. Little does my foe realize the gauntlet that has been cast at his feet. Soon he and I will clash. But not until he suffers more"

Chapter 2:

The SCENE: Stark's lab as he begins to study Blacklash's whip. On a table nearby are Blizzards gauntlets and some of Boomerang's weapons. "Hmm the circuitry is rather sophisticated and I wonder..." His studies are interrupted as Jocasta appears in hologram form and says "Tony! A news bulletin just occurred! Those three you captured have been rescued! Description matches that of some old foes of yours!" A screen comes on and shows photos of the three RAIDERS. "This cant be possible!" Tony exclaimed. "Those three were neutralized in the first Armor Wars, then I beat them again back when I faced down Kearson Dewitt. To my knowledge there were no other suits made!" Sitting back in his chair, Tony rubs his head as a cold sweat begins to form then says, "Jocasta, access files X0989 through X0997. Tie into remote satellite systems for a worldwide scan." Jocasta pauses for a moment as she accesses the secured files and then begins to patch into the Earth's satellites to scan the globe. Tony nervously goes and gets a cup coffee as he thinks, "This can't be happening. How could it? I took every possible precaution..." Sitting back down, he looks again at the circuitry of Blacklash's whip and studies it closely. As he does so a cold chill creeps over his bones that the hot coffee can't dispel. "Dear heaven, no!" he whispers vehemently as he studies the circuits. "Tony," Jocasta says "I have finished a preliminary cursory scan of the Earth and am proceeding for a more comprehensive scan now. However I believe you will want to see the results so far." Tony looks up as a hologram globe of the Earth appears in front of him and begins to slowly rotate. As it does, several small dots of light appear in scattered places around the earth. "It's happening again." Tony says and smashes his fist down on his lab table. "After all I did to stop it last time and keep it from reoccurring, it's happening again!" Gritting his teeth Tony says "Jocasta, please send a priority message to Jim Rhodes. Tell him, "Tony pauses as the agony of what he is about to say comes over him. "Tell him, the Armor Wars have begun anew."

SCENE SHIFT

The Scene: a lab somewhere. We see a rather large Russian as he dons his new improved Titanium Man battle armor. "So this armor is similar in design to the suit the Gremlin wore before his untimely demise eh?" Securing the armor in place around his mammoth form he dons the helmet. "Ah, it feels practically weightless and I can feel its power!" Flexing his armored limbs he notices the newer, more streamlined armor worn by Valentin Shatalov, the current Crimson Dynamo. "So 'comrade'" Dynamo says, "Our suits

are upgraded as they were once before. However I must warn you of one thing" Titanium Man looks at him. "The last time I had a suit like this, Iron Man came and destroyed it. It was that fight that caused the demise of your counterpart, the Gremlin" Titanium Man scoffs "Bah! I do not fear Iron man! With this new suit and reports that he is using an older suit of armor, he won't have a chance!" Dynamo shakes his head "Don't underestimate him. That suit of his in the past has beaten our predecessors before. Whoever Stark employs to wear that suit is no fool. But if we team up, Iron Man will fall." Titanium man nods "yes. Plus our benefactor doesn't want us quarreling with each other anyway. He plans to use us to defeat Iron Man, Stark and then the World!" A new voice then speaks "Quite correct my minions" both of them turn to see a figure in the shadows "With your powers enhanced and combined as well as many others being improved. Iron Man and his employer Tony Stark are indeed in for rough times.' The figure then snaps his fingers and a door opens. Inside the doorway is a silouhetted figure that looks somewhat familiar to the two armored Russians. The two armored Soviets watch warily as a red tracking beam slowly moves from spot to spot on their armor as if seeking a target lock. "But to make things more interesting for them I have contracted the services of another foe of Iron Man's!' The figure steps forward from the door to reveal himself as the villainous WAR MACHINE! The two Russians each instinctively raise their arms as if to fire their weapons when War machine says, "Relax guys! We all work for the same guy!" as he points to the shadowy figure. "But that armor was designed directly by Stark himself!" Dynamo says, "How did you get it?" War Machine chuckles and says, "It was worn by an old friend of his and ex friend of mine. He lost it, and I found it. It was damaged a bit but it was fixed and I fought Iron Man to a stand still twice, and that was in his latest suit of armor. In that old clunker suit of his now, he's had it!" The shadow figure laughs. "Do not underestimate either of them, any of you. For now however I suggest all of you make use of the training facilities to prepare yourselves. Other agents shall continue to distract and soften up our foes." The figure then disappears back into the shadows.

SCENE SHIFT

Next day at Stark's private lab, Rhodey has arrived. "I don't understand Tony." Rhodey says "last time this happened it was because Hammer got your technology from the original Spymaster and sold it to various criminals. You and I did everything possible and then some to stop the stolen technology. You even had Abe Zimmer unleash a virus on the net to wipe all records everywhere except your own systems. How is this happening again?" Tony shakes his head "I don't know Jim. I really don't. We both know that Hammer is gone, lost somewhere in space frozen forever in a block of ice. "Rhodey nods. "But," Tony continues "we both know there is also a new Spymaster and we've already met him a few times, especially recently" Rhodey nods. "Yeah, when Hammer was messing with your head though you nailed Spymaster and the cops took him away. "Tony nods "yes, but if he's anything like the original, no jail will hold him for long unless he wanted it to. I've been spreading some cash, and getting information. Spymaster did escape after getting medical attention. I've been in touch with SHIELD and was able to get Nick to toss me information on Spymaster." Tony points to the hologram globe of the Earth. Several red spots are on it, more having appeared since Jocasta intensified her scan of the planet, but 5 yellow spots have been added, each with a rotating head of Spymaster on them. "These are the known locations where he could be. "Jim looks at Tony "what are you going to do, Tony?" Tony smiles grimly "See if I can infiltrate one of his bases and have a chat with his database, and I have just the suit for the occasion." Tony looks over as his armor vault opens and a rack extends from the wall, a rack that contains the components of the Iron Man stealth armor!

CHAPTER 3

THE TIME: 48 hrs later THE PLACE: an isolated house somewhere in the northern Rocky Mountains.

Hovering 500 yards away, clad in his ebon stealth armor, Iron Man scans the area for signs of hostiles. "So far, nothing" he shakes his head "Spymaster can't just be counting on seclusion to guard this place. But I have no choice, I'm going in." Flying in with his jets muffled by an advanced set of baffles and noise suppressors, Iron Man quickly lands at the front door of Spymasters hideout. "No lifesigns anywhere, and so

far no defense systems have detected my approach." He thinks to himself. "This is almost too easy, despite the Stealth Armor" as he opens the door. Walking carefully through the home, Iron Man scans everything into his armor recorders for later study. A sonic scan reveals a secret door that leads to a small yet sophisticated computer room. "At last" he thinks as he sits down at a control panel. Extending a cybernetic probe from his gauntlet, Iron Man begins to tap into the system and slowly but surely bypass the safeguards. As the data begins to appear on the screen Iron Man shakes his head. "Both Spymasters are truly ruthless killers. Hard to believe that another one was trained to replace the last one that the Ghost killed." Scanning thru the data he finds an encrypted file. Upon accessing it, preliminary analysis indicates it has what he seeks. As he downloads it, Iron Man also slips in a computer virus that he coded earlier as Tony Stark. The virus begins to worm its way into Spymasters network and systematically erase the data stored therein. As he disconnects his probe however, an alarm goes off and the room seals shut. "Intruder detected. Illegal access to Spymaster mainframe. Begin termination sequence" Iron Man looks around as several automatic lasers extend from the walls and begin scanning the room. "Good they can't lock onto me, but I must have tripped a countermeasure when I withdrew the probe. I've got to leave now!" heading to the sealed door, Iron Man attempts to smash through it but the alloy of the armor plating withstands his punch! "Intruder present in room, target lock not functional. Begin random laser discharge!" the computer announces as the lasers open fire in all directions. Some shots strike Iron Man but bounce off and hit the walls. Equipment sparks and shorts out as damage from the laser fire builds up. "Can't take this for long!" he thinks, "Stealth armor has limited resistance at best!" Raising his arms he discharges a repulsor blast into the door, causing it to bend inward from the force of the blow! This time, instead of smashing through the door's armor plating, Iron Man uses the limited strength of the Stealth Armor to rip the bent plating off the door and casts it aside. "Warning! Unknown invader attempting to escape, destruct sequence activated!" the computer sounds an alarm as Iron Man ignites his jets, however as he launches a laser beam strikes one of his boots and fuses the jet mechanisms! "Blast! Half speed at best!" he thinks as he pushes his suit to its limits and beyond to escape Spymaster's trap. Barely escaping in time Iron Man is buffeted and hurled through the skies by the shockwave of the explosion that decimates Spymaster's lair. Stabilizing his flight, Iron Man flies away to a predetermined pick up point where Jim awaits hovering in a helicopter. Entering the chopper, Tony closes the hatch and sits wearily in a seat as Rhodey veers away on a course designed to remove them away from the scene in a quick yet discreet pattern. "How'd things go, Tony?" he asked. Shaking his head, Tony removes the helmet of his stealth armor and says "Hard to say, I downloaded the necessary files and then some, and inputted the virus, but then alarms went off and things went to blazes." He paused for a moment as he gazed at his ebon helmet pondering his options. "From what little I read of the file it seems that the original Spymaster has secret hardcopy files of the Iron Man data he stole from my old Long Island offices." Rhodey nods "And hard copies won't be erased by the virus" Tony nods "yes and even if the virus that Abe wrote erases the data, it can just be reinputted again and again." Tony holds his head in his hands for a moment then looks at Rhodey "But, I've got to fully analyze this data. I doubt seriously that the new Spymaster is the one outfitting super villains. Likely he sold it for a nice profit to someone else. "Rhodey nods as he flies the chopper, "yeah but who? Who among your foes has the resources to properly exploit the technology?" Tony shakes his head. "I don't know for sure Rhodey." He leans back and then begins removing the armor and donning a flight suit. Rubbing his chest for a moment, Tony goes and sits in the copilot seat then takes a special power cord out from behind the seat and plugs it into his heart's power port. Leaning back and closing his eyes, Tony fails to notice Rhodey looks at him for a moment the looks away, sadly.

Scene Change: Another of Spymaster's lairs. The Time: an hour later.

The man the world knows as Spymaster enters his lair, having returned from a round of physical therapy designed to help him recover the usage of the hand that Iron Man crushed (reference bad Blood 2). He notices a blinking light on a wall panel and quickly goes to a computer terminal and frowns in anger at the readouts displayed. "So, someone raided one of my lair's and hacked my database. Likely it was Stark or his tin can lackey!" scanning further, Spymaster reads of the base's destruction and notes the damage inflicted on his files. "Blast! I've lost a lot of critical data, some of which I can't replace easily if at all! He will pay for this!" Sitting in his chair, Spymaster taps a few keys on his terminal and initiates repair sequences to his

system files and backup restorations. "Likely he found the datafiles of his stolen technology. The hardcopies are quite safe, and I'm quite sure my client is safe from that weird virus that erases the data. Still, it would be best to prepare myself for war." With that thought in mind, Spymaster keys a switch to reveal a secret room with a rather nice arsenal of high tech weaponry....

CHAPTER 4:

The SCENE: Tony's lab. The Time: 48 hrs later.

Tony is sitting in a chair as he half-heartedly goes over some business reports as his heart recharges. Eventually though he tosses the reports aside in frustration and grabs a note pad and pen and begins sketching designs again for a new suit of armor. Rhodey looks on at his friend and sees the tension building in Tony. "This is not good. Tony is under too much pressure." Rhodey pours a couple of cups of coffee and thinks "Last time, the Armor Wars was weird but the first Armor Wars nearly killed Tony. I can't let this happen to him again." Sitting next to Tony, Rhodey glances at a computer screen and watches data flow past as Jocasta unscrambles the files taken from Spymaster. He then looks over at a TV as a reporter comments about the recent increase of attacks by armored super villains, "This isn't good." Rhodey thinks again "Tony is having the equivalent of writers block about building a new suit, thanks to what happened to his latest model, and he's reluctant to take direct action like the first time with Negator packs since the public turned on him." Rhodey ponders for a moment, then gets up and heads to the armor vault. Going inside, Rhodey looks around at the assorted armors of Iron Man for a few minutes then lowers his head as he makes a decision. Heading back out, Rhodey stops, startled, as he sees Tony suiting up in the classic suit. "Tony! Where you going?" Tony points to the screen where Rhodey sees a sight that horrifies him. The Renegade War Machine is attacking a Stark-Fujikawa factory! "I've got to stop him, Jim!" Tony says as he clamps on his helmet. "Tony, wait!" Rhodey yells "Think for a minute!' Tony pauses and says, "Jim that suit is my design, I have to stop him!" and flies off. "Damn, Tony! Don't you ever learn?" Rhodey fumes to himself. He then turns to Jocasta and says "Hey, Jo'! Run a scan on that War Machine armor!" Jocasta complies and asks "what are you looking for, Jim?" Rhodey shakes his head "Tony tried a Negator Pack from the first Armor Wars on that suit but it didn't work. If that suit is really mine then why is it functional?" Jocasta appears in hologram form and says "Preliminary analysis indicates that the countermeasures Tony installed after the Armor Wars to keep his systems from being scanned and replicated, also block the Negator Pack. Probability is high that when you lost the suit, it was damaged badly but was repaired." Rhodey nods. "And Tony just zooms off to face a well trained killer in one of his better armor designs, wearing an outdated suit no less, hoping to stop him!" Rhodey slams his fist into his hand. "This stinks. I know Parnell. Someone is paying him to do this and likely the same one that got Tony's tech from Spymaster. "Rhodey pauses as he looks to the armor vault. "Can't believe I'm thinking this, Jocasta, but I have no choice." Rhodey then picks up a phone and contacts Tony's office. "Hello, Happy? It's Jim, can you come to Tony's lab please?" He then looks at Jocasta as a scanner alarm goes off. Rhodey looks at the alarm and lowers his head. "Guess my hunch about it being a trap was right"

Soaring through the sky, Iron Man quickly approaches the area where War Machine was spotted. By the time he gets there however it looks to be too late. "Blast it! Am I too late due to this old suit's jets?" he thinks as he looks around. Quickly helping put out some small fires and clearing some debris for rescue vehicles, Iron Man jets into the sky and scans the area for his foe. "Something isn't right here" he says. Suddenly from behind, a concussion blast strikes him square in the back and sends him crashing to the Earth. Slowly getting up, Iron Man sees War Machine hovering in the sky along with Titanium Man! "Oh boy!" he thinks "One of them sure, but two? This is a trap!" he says as he fires his repulsors at them. Unfortunately both easily dodge the blasts. "Ha! Guess you really aren't ready to play the game today Iron Man!" War Machine gloats as he fires several blasts at Iron Man, who is barely able to dodge. Titanium Man also fires several rounds. "They are playing with me like a cat with a mouse" Iron man thinks. "Tony old boy you've really stepped in it deep this time!" He shakes his head and attempts to fly off but gets blasted down again. "Cant get airborne, no Negator packs. I am in deep trouble," he thinks as several damage alerts go off in his

helmet. "Heh." War Machine chuckles "I wonder if this is the same man in the suit I faced those two other times? Nah! At last he knew how to fight!" His shoulder cannons swivel to lock on to Iron Man. "Time to end the game, tin man!" However Titanium Man intervenes. "No fool! You know our instructions!" War Machine looks at TM for a moment then knocks him aside. "Big deal. I've been paid. I'm changing the game plan!" Locking his weapons onto Iron Man, he prepares to fire when a voice comes over the comm. channels. "I don't think so Parnell!" Pausing, WM looks around. "Rhodes! Where are you?" Swooping in from out of the sun come TWO other Iron Men! One is the Red and Gold Iron Man from the aftermath of the first Armor Wars who tackles Titanium Man! The other is Jim Rhodes in the first model of the War Machine armor! Plowing into the Renegade War Machine, Rhodey sends a haymaker punch into him that drives him into the ground. Staggering to his feet, Iron Man looks on in amazement at his unlikely saviors. Sagging to his knees from exhaustion and his injuries, Tony watches helplessly as the Iron Men combat his foes.

Titanium Man recovers and easily knocks aside the Red and Gold Iron Man. Red and Gold recovers a bit slowly then moves in as if he was a boxer and begins throwing punches at TM. "Good lord!" Tony thinks "Happy!" Looking in horror as his two best friends fight his battle for him, he slowly rises to his feet, gathering his strength. "The first Titanium Man nearly killed him all those years ago, and Happy has no where near my experience!" Clenching his fists, Tony launches into the sky at Titanium Man in an effort to aid his friend. Together the two double team TM and slowly begin to wear him down, until TM's stasis beam strikes Happy and sends him crashing to Earth, leaving Tony to face him. "So my outdated foe" TM gloats "its between us now" and the two clash. "Not this time murderer!" Iron Man yells as he pounds TM with his fists.

Some distance away the two WM's clash. People look on in awe at this legendary clash of armored titans as reporters arrive on the scene and begin to report on events. "No way you walk away Parnell!" Rhodey yells as he targets his shoulder cannon on the renegade and lets loose. "That armor isn't yours! I've come to stop you once and for all." Unfortunately, without his noticing, the renegade WM activates his energy sword and gut slices him! While the alloy of the WM armor is resistant to a point the attack still catches Rhodey by surprise and causes some system damage to his armor. Activating his own energy sword, Rhodey begins to circle Parnell. Each one looking for an opening to exploit so that one may win at the expense of the other.

Tony and TM continue to clash but Tony is slowly losing as his damaged armor catches up to him. A concussion blast from TM sends Iron Man back to Earth. TM lands and grabs him by the neck and lifts him up "if it weren't for my current master, you'd already be dead." He whispers as he throws Iron Man aside. However while distracted by his gloating, TM failed to notice the recovered Happy Hogan position himself and let loose his pulse bolts! The bolts catch TM directly in the back and cause serious damage, rendering him helpless. Getting up Happy snarls "that was payback for all those years ago!" and sends a kick into TM's chest, knocking him backward. Running to the injured Iron Man, Happy quickly notes the progress of the clash of the WM's.

The two WM's have been deadlocked in a stalemated battle. Both armor's and wearer's apparently unable to gain a lasting advantage. Tony looks at the fight and whispers to Happy. "Listen. Your suit was the first I built to project an EM pulse attack. It will disable them and you for 6 minutes. Hit them with it and the fight ends. Just let me get out of range first" Happy looks at him "Huh? Are you hurt that bad, boss?" Tony shakes his head "No, but I don't know if my new heart can take a pulse and I don't want to find out the hard way if it can't." Standing up slowly, Iron Man launches into the skies and opens a commlink to Happy. "When I give the signal move into them and hit them with the pulse. Then I can move back in." Iron Man checks his system readouts and compares his distance from the scene with his memories of the pulse range of his armor. "Ready...set...NOW!" Quickly flying to the two WM's, Happy detonates the EM pulse attack. Everyone looks on in surprise, not realizing what happened as all three armored combatants freeze up then collapse. Quickly returning to the scene, Iron Man lands by the helpless combatants. Slowly, with great effort, Rhodey flips him a thumb up and says "Good plan, Iron Man!" Moving quickly, Iron Man

removes first the helmet, then the rest of the armor from the mercenary Parnell. Reporters quickly converge, despite their lack of equipment working and begin bombarding our heroes with questions. Setting the armor of the Renegade WM down, Iron Man helps his friends up to their feet where they attempt to stay steady as their systems recover. Iron man then turns to the media and raises his hands "ladies and gentlemen of the press" he begins "I'm certain you all have some questions. However please direct your inquiries to Tony Stark himself. I'm under orders from him to not answer your questions at this time!" He then turns to gather the WM armor, when Parnell begins laughing. "You fool, Iron Man. You still don't get what is going on do you?" Iron Man turns to him and Parnell is about to speak again when he suddenly convulses and screams in agony as he bursts into flames and is consumed before everyone's eyes!

Meanwhile over at a hidden base, a shadowy figure leans back in his chair with this fingers intertwined. Light can be seen glinting off the rings on his fingers. "So much for that fool mercenary! However Iron Man has been dealt a serious blow. His suit is damaged and Stark apparently has yet to design something new. A few more attacks to soften him up then I shall move in for the kill, despite the arrival of those second hand Iron Men!" Sitting back, the mysterious villain chuckles to himself contentedly as he casually gestures. Back at the fight scene, unnoticed by anyone, Titanium Man fades away into nothingness. Turning slowly from the ashes of Parnell, Rhodey attempts to contain his nausea. Iron Man stares in shock as he begins to realize who is likely behind this whole thing. Turning to the media he again states, "Please direct your questions to Tony Stark." Looking at his friends, they nod to each other and launch into the sky, leaving behind a confused and grossed out set of reporters.

Over the next few hours the news reports are abuzz with speculation over the events that have transpired. Tony and Happy and Jim all sit in his lab sipping some assorted drinks as Jocasta runs a medical scan of them for injuries. On the far side of his lab, automated equipment is running repair routines on the armors. Tony however has his armor, on the table in from of him as he gazes at the helmet that he wore for many years, noting the damage done to it and how his fear of his advancing technology nearly led to his death this day. "I can't believe I was so bull headed as to believe that my old tried and true suit could stand against War Machine." Tony says. Happy pats his shoulder and says, "Cheer up, Tony. Despite what happened to Parnell, you should chalk this one up as a win. This battle of the Armor Wars definitely goes to the good guys. Between us all, the renegade War Machine was stopped and the armor confiscated." Rhodey nods. "Parnell took the wrong turn some time ago, Tony. Don't be too broken up about his death." Rhodey sips his drink. "I still want to know who is behind all this." He says. Tony nods, still gazing at his old helmet. "Me too, old friend." Getting up, Tony says "Jocasta, please schedule a press conference for 2 hours from now." Plugging his heart in to recharge, Tony looks over at his friends, both of who look a bit uneasy. Tony smiles for a moment. "Sorry friends, but the old body battery was getting a bit low." They both nod and Happy says, "I know Tony, it just looks weird, sorry" Tony smiles "It's okay. It's not as bad as it looks." Rhodey nods and asks "But what are you going to tell the media?" Tony grimaces for a moment as he considers his options "I can't let the media and the public go against our efforts like in the first Armor Wars, Jim. So I'm going to do something that many good businessmen do, yet which I hate" Rhodey looks at him skeptically for a moment then Tony smiles weakly and says "I'm going to tell some of the truth and lie about the rest."

Two hours later Tony confronts the media. Gripping the podium in front of him, Tony puts on his best face and says "ladies and gentlemen of the press" looking around at the assembled media before him he continues. "I realize that events today have raised many questions. A recent major malfunction of the current suit he was using forced me to retire it pending further study of the problem. The more traditional suit he was using was the only spare unit I had available at the time for him to use." Another reporter then asks "What of the other two then?" Tony smiles. 
"Just in the nick of time," Iron Man says to the body in his arms.

"Untested and unreliable but, it's all I have for now," he says stepping in front of a glass case that seemed to be a copy of the War Machine armor except for a few extra attachments.


"The Stealth War Machine Armor. I never thought I would use this," he says opening the case.



New Iron Man armor – Bilodo style!



Here are the basic criteria I abided to while conceiving and designing my Iron Man armor:

- -Realistic, practical, comfortable and effective are the important concepts here.
- -The suit must not get in the way of normal movements of the human body.
- -It protects the joints.
- -Good shoulder and neck protection without limiting the arm, head and neck movements.
- -A helmet that looks like a real helmet and that takes into consideration the wearer's nose.
- -The eye slits are close to the face for a better vision (contrary to all previous models, except for the prometheum armor).
- -The helmet is inspired from a motorcycle helmet, because they offer an excellent protection with their interior padding. Of course, this one is bigger than the traditional Iron Man helmet. But when you take a good look at proportions, I think Stark always looks like he has too small a head.
- -It must not look like a monster or a robot.
- -It should look graceful, classy and noble.
- -It exclusively uses laser armament; there's nothing faster than light after all. No machine guns or canons.
- -Both forearms are equipped with a laser canon.
- -I wanted it to be light, manageable, fast and comfortable for Tony. This is the final result. I added some outlet jets on the calves to obtain boosts of speed if necessary.

TOMB RAIDER


June 15
