Happy New Year Ferrophiles! Hope you had a truly joyous Christmas filled with many happy memories, pleasant time with friends and family, good food and an abundance of holiday cheer.

The New Year marks the dawning of a new "Iron Age" for Shellhead and ferrophiles, as the creative team of writer Mike Grell and artist Michael Ryan debut with, fittingly enough, January's issue 50.

Though the numbering of the current volume remains, Marvel Editor Tom Brevoort, quoted at the Marvel Website and in other interviews, sees the arrival of the new creative team as a sort of "relaunch" for the Golden Avenger. In fact, during the first six months of 2002, Marvel is unofficially dedicating its resources to shining the spotlight on Tony Stark and his newly armored alter ego, Iron Man.

Celebrating the 50 issue milestone with an anniversary-sized issue, #55 will also be an oversized issue, which includes a story written and illustrated by new Iron-scribe Mike Grell. The reason for two extra-sized issues? Under E-I-C Joe Quesada's "dual issue number initiative," Iron Man volume 3, issue 55 would mark Iron Man's 400<sup>th</sup> volume 1 appearance.

Iron Man will be getting high profile exposure in other Marvel books as well. Shellhead will appear in the "Enemy of the State II" storyline running in issues 41-44 of the critically acclaimed and immensely enjoyable Black Panther series. Writer Christopher Priest promises one entire issue will feature a "knockdown drag out" between T'Challa and Tony. Also, the "real" Ultimate version of Tony Stark and Iron Man will make their debut in Ultimates #1, the revamped Avengers of the Ultimate Marvel universe.

Only time will tell how well the new team's run will be received, but if early fan response and industry buzz are any indication, 2002 could well be the beginning of a new "Iron Era."



## Remo Files

Now Ferrophiles, on to our exclusive interview with new Iron Man scribe, Mike Grell-



#### Al- Tell us a little about the person, Mike Grell.

I'm married to a wonderful friend, Lauri. We have a bouncing 19 year-old son, Torrin, born the year I created the character Torin Mac Quillon in STARSLAYER, although Lauri and I didn't meet until years later and she does NOT read comics. We live in Lake Stevens, WA, north of Seattle, where we raise Friesian horses, the big, black horses you've seen in LADYHAWKE and MASK OF ZORRO (Despite the line in Zorro stating that the horse was a "black Andalusian stallion", it was really played by three Friesian geldings and one Mexican mustang for the bucking sequence).

We both perform with a medieval action troupe called THE SEATTLE KNIGHTS, jousting and sword fighting (see their website <a href="www.seattleknights.com">www.seattleknights.com</a> for photos of us in action).

#### Al- How did you go about breaking into the field of comics?

Badly. I started out aiming for a newspaper strip and darned near missed, except for assisting on BRENDA STARR in the early '70's and doing TARZAN from '81-'83. In 1973, I went to the New York Comicon and met Allen Asherman and Irv Novick. They liked my portfolio and told me to get my carcass up to Julie Schwartz's office. Julie greeted me with his usual warmth: "What the hell makes you think you can draw comics?"— then called Joe Orlando in to review my portfolio and Joe gave me an Aquaman script to draw.

Al- During the 1980's, you were one of the most successful and well-known writer/artists in the independent market, with your creation: Jon Sable. What do you think contributed to your success as an independent producer?

Like the bumble bee, I never read a book on aerodynamics. I recognized the relative unfairness in the industry and saw independents as a means of correcting things. I was the first to sign with Pacific, but my book came out second because Jack Kirby could draw an issue in about the time it took you to read it. I was the second creator to sign with First Comics, because — despite Pacific's problems — I refused to believe independent publishing wasn't the answer, and because my old pal Mike Gold was editor. Beyond that, though, I made a conscious decision to turn away from superheroes and fantasy and anchor my new character SABLE in the real world. (I was also a little tired of skintight suits and it took me years to learn how to NOT draw bulging muscles.) I fully expected to lose half my audience and was pleasantly surprised to find that they had grown along with me. On occasion, I confess, I have written just for the money and tailored my stories for a particular audience (Hey, I did SPAWN, right?), but my best material has been done for an audience of one: me. I try to write the kind of stories I'd like to read. I'm just lucky enough that a lot of people have the same tastes.

Al- You are also closely associated with DC's "Green Arrow," as well as "The Warlord" during this time. What are some of the differences, both positive and negative, between working for one of the "Big 2" versus producing a creator owned book with a smaller company?

There's always a certain comfort factor in knowing that, even if the sales on the book are borderline, you're still going to get paid in full. On the other hand, I don't know a single creator who hasn't got a pet project squirreled away somewhere that they'll only do for an independent, because they don't want to surrender the rights or sacrifice creativity for editorial policy. When it works right, both can have great benefits... or drawbacks. As an independent, you get a greater percentage of the money, but there may not be much left after expenses. With a major publisher, you'll always get your paycheck, but you may not get the big bucks from a movie or toy deal.

Al- Throughout the early 90's, we only saw sporadic and brief output by Mike Grell (re. Shaman's Tears & Maggie the Cat). Again, you published your creations with an independent publisher (Image Comics). Can you share a little about your experience with Image (compared to and contrasted with First)?

The biggest difference was in the numbers. When I did SHAMAN'S TEARS and MAGGIE THE CAT, I hired Mike Gold to act as in-house editor on the projects, because I believe being your own editor is the certain road to disaster.

Al- What do you see as the contributing factor to the brevity of these projects?

The frantic collector craze. People were buying comics sealed in mylar bags, never to be opened, on the bet that they'd increase in value and the collector would be sitting on the next hot collector's item. Todd McFarlane boasted to me that he had fans bringing comics to be signed that they had never even read (It wouldn't be "MINT" anymore, would it?). Here's a tip: Anything that exists in an edition of 500,000 is NOT a collectible. As soon as the first speculator tried to resell one of his "collectibles" to a dealer, the dealer probably pulled out a box full of them at 50 cents. There went the market. Sales dropped below the profit margin, and that was it. Comics today are struggling to sell half what we sold in 1973.

Al- From the mid-to-late 90's until now, the comic industry witnessed the virtual disappearance of many creators, yourself included. What happened to you? What were you doing/where were you focusing your creative energies during this time?

I began concentrating on writing and painting. I recently published my first novel, SABLE, and got a sale on a screenplay on the same subject. I've written a couple more screenplays which are getting some serious interest, and am working on another SABLE novel along with a couple more projects.

#### Al- What brought about your return to the field of comics?

My old pal and agent Ken Levin has a great relationship with Marvel, and he knew I was interested in getting back to the comic racks. After a meeting in New York, he gave me the heads up that I could expect a call from Marvel.

Al- In the past, some of your projects were closely associated with independent publishers. This could indicate a fiercely protective streak or a dislike for the "Big 2" and their policies. Now, after a long absence from the scene, you are writing a major character for Marvel. Any comments about your return to the "majors," so to speak?

It's really no different from doing THE LONGBOW HUNTERS or BATMAN MASQUE. Taking an assignment with a major publisher doesn't make me a whore (Okay, maybe SPAWN did.) and it doesn't mean I believe any less in the right of creators to benefit from their creations.

#### Al- After never doing Marvel characters before, why Iron Man?

Why not? I suppose, if given the choice, I'd pick CAPTAIN AMERICA or BLACK WIDOW as my favorite Marvel characters, but they weren't offered and Iron Man was.

#### Al- How have you gone about researching Tony Stark's/Iron Man's history?

Hey, I was there at the beginning. We're talking my childhood here. (Well... okay, post-adolescence, pre-girls... you get the idea.) Couple that with a solid editorial

relationship with Tom Brevoort and the loan of a giant stack of back issues from my pal Phillip Anderson at Artwork World (see www.artworkworld.com) who handles a lot of my art, so he has a vested interest in seeing that I get it right. I've managed to get the hang of it. Tom can always be relied on to keep me from straying too far off the path.

#### Al- Do you feel you have a solid grasp on the character and his history?

Egghead builds super armor, joins AA but still loses company and girl. Yeah, I think I've got it.

#### Al- What will your main focus be when writing Iron Man, the man or the armor?

You can't have one without the other, but is seems like the man has been overshadowed by the armor. My main focus is going to be on the *man* in the Iron Man. One of the things I always liked about Tony Stark was that, apart from his intellect, he was pretty much an ordinary guy... until he put on the armor. It made him more identifiable with the readers. He also had a major human frailty, a heart that couldn't sustain his life without periodic recharging. The heart's gone now, replaced by a mechanical version, but I've restored that human weakness by requiring him to recharge or die. Pretty much like before, but now the recharging period can be anywhere from 24-48 hours, depending on how much energy he uses. He can draw energy from his armor while wearing it, but he can also deplete his power source as Iron Man, further endangering his life. In other words, if he uses all his power to perform some heroic act, it could cost him his life.

As I said before, I like the basic humanity of the guy, and his human weaknesses. At the early stages of his career as an inventor/boy genius he pursued a lot of things that he probably shouldn't have, almost as a mental exercise just to see if he could. I'm bringing him face-to-face with some of the demons from his past and a few new ones. Physically, he's Joe Less-Than-Average (he now has a neck smaller than his thigh and no longer wears a size 3 7/8 hat), still athletic but with a serious heart problem that could kill him at any moment. It makes him more aware of the important things in life and maybe a little desperate to make a difference.

## Al- How about Iron Man? Many writers see the two as somewhat dichotomous characters.

Not at all. They are one and the same, nothing schizo about it... BUT... As Iron Man Tony can be free to experience all the things he's missing, the rush of flying, the thrill of battle and the satisfaction of just kicking the crap out of some son of a bitch who really deserves it. As Iron Man, Tony becomes a modern knight-in-shining-armor.

## Al- If you could only use three words to describe Tony Stark, what would they be?

Sexy Bill Gates?!??

#### Al- And Shellhead?

Tony's inner child.

Al- In your research, did you gain an appreciation for a particular Iron Man storyline?

Well, it may be purist, but I always liked the origin.

#### Al- Did any single issue stand out?

Well, I hope #50 will. I also liked the Sentient Armor storyline, right up until it ripped its heart out. I felt it took away that element of human frailty that was at the - uh - heart of the character.

#### Al- Who is your favorite supporting character?

I always thought Tony should have wound up with Pepper.

#### **Al-** Favorite villain?

The Black Widow, when they were at odds. Even when they weren't.

#### Al- Will you be building any of your stories on what has come before?

Of course. When you're dealing with an icon of the comic industry, you can't reject decades of history as if they never existed. There's a lot of great material to draw on for inspiration.

#### Al- Why do you think Iron Man has endured for almost 40 years?

I think people like him because at the heart of the character is an ordinary guy who just happens to have done an extraordinary thing. Along the way he's struggled to overcome serious physical and emotional problems and, maybe best of all, (he) hasn't always done exactly the right thing... but he sure as hell tried.

#### Al- What kind of contribution to Shelhead's mythos do you see yourself making?

That's like asking: "How do you think history will remember you?" Only time will tell.

#### Al- Will you be doing any artwork on the book...covers perhaps?

Yes. At this moment there are no concrete plans for covers, but it's been discussed. I will be illustrating a 12 page story I'm writing for issue #55 (#400 under the old numbering system.)

Al- Any comments about your cohort, Michael Ryan? He's not exactly the most well known creator.

He will be. Michael's complex designs and attention to detail are amazing. After seeing what he did with an exploding airplane, I no longer have reservations about writing scenes that would be beyond the range of a lot of artists... including myself.

Now and then, like when I'm writing a scene involving a split panel showing a big parade in Chinatown above an elaborate drug manufacturing complex below the streets, I find myself thinking "Better him than me."

Al- We know, from advanced press, that your first storyline deals with Tony investigating the murders of homeless Europeans, in a war ravaged country, with the possibility that weapons Tony created in the past are being used to commit the crimes. What can readers look forward to next?

Look for the return of an old nemesis with a new twist in issues 53,54 & 55, entitled "BOOK OF THE TEN RINGS". And the back-up in 55 is a pip. (Ed. Note-This marks Mike's first professional work for Marvel as an artist.)

Al- Other than new armor at the beginning of your tenure, any other tantalizing tidbits you can share exclusively with A.I. readers?

The next story arc (after the Mandarin makes his reappearance) will re-connect Tony and Rumiko and send Iron Man into a nightmare world of Ty Stone's imagination.

Al- Well ferrophiles, that does it for me. Sounds like Mr. Grell has given us quite a bit to look forward to. A.l. and I want to thank Mike for his willingness to answer our questions, as well as for the time he took out of his busy schedule to answer them. Until next time- *Chris*.

#### I LOVE THIS TOWN!!

The first time I visited **New York City** was back in 1985. I was playing in a band (I was a junior in college) and our guitar player's brother lived on 56<sup>th</sup> street. We went up to listen to some bands, drink, and generally have a nutty 'ol time. I didn't visit again until 2001, when my father-in-law from Costa Rica was visiting. He wanted to see the Big Apple,

and my wife and I obliged. Most of that trip was focused on seeing the **Statue of Liberty** and hanging around **Battery Park**. And, the twin towers of the **World Trade Center**, which were only a few blocks away. This was only *two weeks* prior to September 11, folks.

I just got back from my 3<sup>rd</sup> sojourn there. I suppose the main thing I noticed was a **much friendlier attitude** among the residents. Whether this is due to **9/11** or the revitalization of the city since **Rudy Giuliani's** term, I cannot say. Probably a combo of both, based on what a few people told me. For example, there was our hotel bellhop, Fausto, who talked about the day of 9/11 at length. I asked him if he lived Manhattan, to which he said, "No, the Bronx." He then added on his own, "Before Giuliani, the subways were a mess. Dangerous. Now, they're clean and getting to work is no hassle."

Ground Zero was well protected. There were cops everywhere, and viewing platforms were almost done being constructed so that people could see the wreckage up close. These were actually

completed on the second day of my visit (I visited GZ on my first full day), but a couple of cabbies told me that the lines to get on the platforms were up to five blocks long! As you can see, without the platforms, glimpses of the **Tower remains** were limited. Still, the view kept improving as we moved around the area, the last one being the most revealing. The whole area is over 10 acres, so you can imagine the size of this in a cramped territory like Manhattan. In addition,

the **makeshift memorials** were at times overwhelming. They ringed virtually the **whole perimeter** of Ground Zero. Posters from classrooms from across the nation were there, missing person notices, and sympathy cards were in abundance. It was indeed solemn.

#### **SEAN CHEN – AT HOME**

I was hoping to get a quick visit in to **Marvel's offices**, but alas it was impossible. I arrived in NYC late Friday afternoon (12/28), and Marvel closed shop at 3pm that day, not to reopen until January 2<sup>nd</sup>. Just my luck. But hold on! Several times in the past I had asked former **Iron Man** artist extraordinaire **Sean Chen** about getting together in NYC since he did the book. Nothing had ever worked out – until now! Before I left for the Big Apple, I e-mailed Sean about meeting, and

he graciously agreed. I called him as soon as arrived Friday afternoon (still hoping I wasn't too late to see Marvel), but he wasn't in. I left a message and he returned my call while I was at dinner. He sadly informed me about Marvel's vacation time, but cordially invited me over to his humble abode Sunday afternoon! Can you say, "All riiiiiiight!" ??



My wife Grettel and daughter Vanessa had accompanied me to NYC, along with another has-an-only-child-that-is-a-daughter couple who we got to know quite well via our daughters' dance classes. While our wives and daughters did the female "shopping thing," Roger (the other dad) and I snagged a cab and headed off to Sean's place. (No, I won't reveal where he lives, you ninnies! J) What I will reveal is that his apartment was very very nice – Sean himself had made most of the furniture! He

stated that this is a hobby of his, and that his parents have a shop in Maryland where he can woodwork at his leisure. In the corner of the main room was **Sean's drawing table**, complete with a huge show window right in back of it, with a magnificent view of the **Empire State Building**. To the left of the drawing table was a small bookshelf with many reference books and guides (about subjects like planes, cars, etc.). On the left wall was a large bookshelf (made by

Sean himself) complete with works of all subjects and authors, most of which were not art related.



Sean was working on an Iron Man pic as we entered! Why? Well, as A.I. reported via A.I.M. (Advanced Iron Mailer) back on December 14, George Tuska will have an IM pin-up in issue #55....and so will Sean! As a matter of fact, so will many past IM artists, Sean revealed, since #55 is IM's 400th issue overall. Sean also has just finished an issue of his current title. Wolverine, of which he had a complete photocopy. Geez, I gotta tell 'ya, flipping through those pages sure made me yearn for Mr. Chen's pencils back on our favorite armored Avenger!

Speaking of *Wolverine*, I'm sure most of you know that **Frank Tieri** – recently departed **IM** scribe – writes it. Sean showed Roger and I a copy of Frank's most recent plot, and it was interesting how Sean scribbles small little doodles right on the pages of the plot to get his ideas flowing. It looked like the next step was laying out various panels on what can best be described as a gridded sheet of paper, criss-crossed by roughly 10 lines across and up & down. Looking through Frank's plot it was clear that Tieri gives his artist quite a bit of creative "leeway" in determining the pages' layout. In other words, his plot was very general, at least much more general than others I have seen from other writers. Certainly this is not a good or bad thing, just a case of personal preference. I'm sure many artists appreciate creative leeway such as Frank's.

#### I KNEW I SAW HER SOMEPLACE BEFORE....!



#### **The Ones Who Got Away**

How I overlooked it until now, I'll never know. After reading IRON MAN 225 and 226 -- "Stark Wars" ("Armor Wars"), Parts One and Two -- for the umpteenth time recently, I noticed something astonishing: a couple of armored baddies employing Stark's Iron Man technology had slipped through the cracks!

It was easy to miss, too, unless a reader read both **225 and 226** in one sitting.



In issue 225, on page 29, panel 6, Tony and Rhodey look at a computer file which lists the names of armored who bought the stolen Iron Man technology designs from Justin Hammer. Two of the names, partially obscured in panel 6, also appear on a printout that Stark downloaded from the West Coast Avengers database; namely, Professor Power and Shockwave. Cameos of this duo are presented on page 9, panel 1. However, in issue 226, page 13, panel 7. Tony again reviews the West Coast Avengers file, only this time Professor Power -- listed as "Power, Anthony" -- is ruled out as a receiver of the pirated technology, because it's stated that his name hadn't appeared on the Hammer file! Surely an innocent oversight by David Michelinie and Bob Layton.

Then I got to thinking: would either **Professor Power** or **Shockwave** have posed much of a threat to Iron Man?

Professor Anthony Power was a brilliant historian, diplomatic advisor to U. S. presidents, and a patriot of the highest degree -- until his severely traumatized son Matthew returned home from the Vietnam War. In an attempt to help his son, Power enlisted the assistance of Charles Xavier.

Matthew's psyche ultimately became a battlefield on which Xavier clashed with Mentallo, resulting in the young man's death. Grief stricken to the point of irrationality, Power, with the financial backing and technical support of several sympathetic American businessmen and scientists, transferred his mind into the body of his deceased son. Donning a specially-designed, high-powered body armor, Professor Power vowed revenge upon Charles Xavier and his X-Men.

Power's armor gives its wearer the powers of flight, super-strength, and laser-beam projection. Clearly, the suit is vastly inferior to the Model VIII Mark I (Silver Centurion) Iron Man armor.



Because Power had a solid source of independent funding and scientific aid for his anti-mutant crusade, it's doubtful he would seek out additional help from the likes of Justin Hammer.

Interesting note. Currently in the pages of THUNDERBOLTS, notably issue 58, Mentallo and a band of escaped supervillians -- one of whom is Hawkeye! -- are currently in the process of obtaining

"the greatest weapon on Earth, courtesy of the late and not-at-all lamented Justin Hammer!" I mentioned to T-BOLTS writer Fabian Nicienza, via a message board post, that I hoped like heck that this "weapon" has some link to the original "Stark Wars"/"Armor Wars." His reply: "We'll see." I'm thrilled to

pieces! Start checking out THUNDERBOLTS.

I asked Iron Scribe David Michelinie if he had any thoughts, comments, or background on the character of Shockwave. He didn't. In fact, I had a difficult time trying to find anything whatsoever on this particular armor-clad warrior. Out of desperation, I posted an online plea for info on Shockwave -- and I got it!



Secret agent Lancaster Sneed suffered severe injuries from a shrapnel burst during a mission in North Africa. As part of his rehabilitation, Sneed's body was rebuilt with metal plates. He, however, was deemed medically and psychologically unfit for active duty, and, as a result, dropped out of sight, fleeing to the Orient where he honed his already-keen martial arts skills and developed an electrically-charged exoskeleton which emitted "shockwaves" when brought into contact with his flailing fists and feet. Sneed joined a traveling carnival as a martial arts sensation but quickly tired of his sideshow status and soon joined the ranks as an operative for hire, putting him on a collision course with Shang-Chi.

Marvel's master of Kung Fu and son of Dr. Fu Manchu!

A comparison between Shockwave's battlesuit and Iron Man's armor is laughable, especially when one considers that Shang-Chi once easily defeated Shockwave by **simply knocking him into a pool of water**: **Zzzttttt!** 

It's reasonably safe to assume that the rig worn by Shockwave wasn't advanced enough to even accept **Iron Man technology!** 

Conclusion: Neither Professor Power nor Shockwave posed a significant enough threat to warrant a visit from our Invincible Iron Man during the "Stark Wars." Lucky for them.




#### Marvel Legends Custom Cover Sketch Cards by Bob Layton!

I chatted with one card collector in the know, and he stated that the *Layton cards sell for anywhere between \$100 and \$300!* I was able grab a few card images from various sources. Bonjour! If you're like me and you simply can't get enough iron in your diet, if IM back issues are simply not enough to satiate your thirst for Stark action, then this column is for you. As per usual, I'll review three cool comics featuring our good buddy Iron Man for you. Okay, so I don't exclusively review cool comics, but it just so happens that this time, all three of them are. The issues are from a quarterly series that started in 1990 under the title "Marvel Super-heroes". Each seasonal issue featured between three and six stories, each about a different Marvel character. On at least three occasions, Shell-head was featured in the pages of MSH, in summer 90, spring 92 and spring 93.

Let's **travel back in time** to the days shortly following the **Armor Wars**... when **Stark** was wearing that cool

red and gold armor that had replaced its silver centurion predecessor. Miss those days? Then you'll get a kick out of this. The story begins with Stark arguing with Edgar Eliot, a representative of the defence department. Stark Enterprises has developed a new rocket engine and the government wants it exclusively. Stark declines of course, he's been out of the weapons trade for years and he has no intention of going back.

That answer does not satisfy **Mr. Eliot**, to say the least. He returns to **SE** under the cover of night and gains access to the premises thanks to a security guard that is **actually on his payroll**. If the obsessive **Eliot** can't have the rocket, **no one will!** Using a **powerful acid** as his means of sabotage, he unwittingly causes the engine to **blow up**, releasing the new and powerful coolant. 



If I was to ask you to tell me, off the top of your head, how many times has Iron Man died... what would you answer? Once? Twice? Would you believe at least seven times?

As we all know, death in comics is much easier to cheat than death in real life. **Iron Man** was never an exception to that rule. In fact, our hero died so often, it makes you wonder when he'll next kick the bucket! Here's a list of **Iron Man deaths**, let me know if I'm missing any:

- 1) **Iron Man** and all his fellow **Avengers** (except Moondragon and Thor) were killed by the cosmically empowered **Korvac** in <u>Avengers #177</u> along with the **Guardians of the Galaxy**, for good measure. **Korvac** finally brought the heroes back to life with his dying breath, after being spurned by the woman he loved. Women... can't live with them, can't live without them;-)
- 2) Iron Man (Rhodey), the Avengers, the X-Men, Spidey, Hulk and all the heroes present on Battleworld were blown to bits by Doctor Doom in the penultimate issue of the Secret Wars mini-series. In the end, the heroes were brought back to life thanks to the Beyonder tricking Doom into losing control of his omnipotence. Tsk... loser... I could deal with omnipotence... just try me...
- 3) **Iron Man** was next killed in the pages of <u>West Coast Avengers annual #2</u>. Along with the rest of the team, **Tony** ingested a powerful poison in order to enter **Death**'s realm and save the souls of the **East coast Avengers**. The now dead **Iron Man** was then killed (if such a thing is possible) by an exploding bomb in <u>Avengers annual #16</u>, seconds before becoming **Count Dracula**'s next meal! Remember that next time you think you're having a bad day!
- 4) Iron Man and a ton of other heroes died at the hands of Thanos in the pages of Infinity
  Gauntlet #4. Actually, IM got his head ripped off by Terraxia, the cute (?!?) purple chick
  Thanos created as his perfect mate. She even referred to Tony as "that metal-clad nuisance that pestered you" while still playing with his severed head. How rude!
- 5) The next one is up for debate. Did **Stark** actually die in <u>Iron Man #284</u>? He sure came close if he didn't. And although he was kept in cryogenic suspension, thus keeping his body from truly and completely dying, he did refer to this experience afterwards as "when I died". Highly philosophical debate to be had here, folks.
- 6) I won't elaborate on **Stark**'s death at the end of <u>The Crossing</u>. I'd prefer to forget that ridiculous storyline if that's okay with you. Just mentioning it like this is painful enough.

7) Iron Man, along with just about every other non-mutant superhero in the Marvel universe, was killed while sacrificing his life to defeat **Onslaught**. He was then reborn to a "new life" thanks to Franklin Richards' reality-altering powers. For 12 issues anyway. We learned in the 13<sup>th</sup> issue that **Stark** had been killed by some aliens who then stole his armor, but that's an alternate reality of some sort (and it sucked **greatly**) therefore it doesn't count. And speaking of alternate realities...

The comics in which we've been privileged to see **Iron Man** die the most often, I think, is the <u>What If series</u>. In almost all of his appearances there, **Iron Man** ended up dead. It's a fact, just see for yourself:

What if #3 «What if the Avengers had never been?»: After getting a thorough beating by the Hulk and Namor, Iron Man sacrifices his remaining power to save the life of Henry Pym, and, deprived of his life-sustaining chest plate, he finally dies of a heart attack.

What if #25 «What if Thor and the Avengers battled the gods?»: Loki kills Iron Man with the help of Odin's powerful battle-sword.

What if #32 «What if the Avengers had become pawns of Korvac?»: With a simple gesture, Korvac vaporizes Iron Man to atoms.

What if vol.2 #25 «What if the Marvel super-heroes had lost Atlantis attacks?»: Iron Man is roasted alive by the demon Seth.

What if vol.2 #33 "What if Phoenix rose again?": Iron Man is killed by the Sentinels.

What if vol.2 #54 «What if Death's Head I had lived?»: Iron Man (War Machine) is slaughtered when Charnel thrusts razor sharp blades through his helmet's eye slits.

<u>What if vol.2 #55</u> «What if the Avengers lost Operation: Galactic Storm»: **Iron Man** blows himself up to take out the **Kree accusers** with him.

What if vol.2 #66 «What if Rogue possessed the power of Thor?»: Mystique freezes Iron Man in his armor and uses him as a human bomb in order to destroy power generators. Apparently, and contrary to the events of the Avengers annual this story is based on, he does not survive the ordeal.



Welcome back to the second edition of **BEST OF THE BEST.** This is the column where the two A.I. editors pontificate about the "best" of a particular aspect of **Iron Man.** In our first column, we rapped about **IM's best battles.** This time out we're going to slow it down a bit, and investigate the "best" women in **Tony Stark's/Iron Man's life.** Who was the best match for Tony? Who would make the best...wife? Who just didn't cut it? Here are our picks for best and worst Stark babes of all time:

#### **#1. BETHANY CABE**

Other than Jim Rhodes, no other Michelinie/Layton
Iron Man creation has been better than the gorgeous,
glamorous Beth Cabe. Of course, it certainly helped
matters that her first appearances were handled by the
competent John Romita Jr. on pencils, and Bob
Layton on inks (her debut was in IM #117). What
makes Beth number one is not only her beauty, but her
inner strength. She was a P.I. and professional
bodyguard, held Tony together during his initial bout
with alcoholism (IM #128), and even donned the
Iron Man armor one time (IM #300). Now that's
grit! She later returned to Stark's employ as head of
security, even challenging Rhodey in his War Machine

armor - "That suit doesn't scare me" (in War Machine #8).

Pat: I have to completely agree with Dave about this one and I have yet to meet the Iron Fan who would disagree with us. If you are reading this and think otherwise, drop us a mail! Beth was the best all right: intelligent, self-reliant, adventurous, sexy... she's the only

one who understands Stark and who shared a friendship with him as strong as their love. \*Sigh\* Beth, come baaaaaaaack! ;-)

#### **#2. PEPPER POTTS/HOGAN**

Who has been with Tony longer than Pepper? Soon after her first appearance in *Tales of Suspense #45*, IM's adventures were chock full of thought balloons where Tony and/or Pepper were silently longing for one another. But, of course, things just never seemed to click. Whether it was Tony's **bum ticker** in the early days, to friend **Happy Hogan's crush on her**, to the **inherent danger** of being close to Stark/Iron Man, Tony and Pepper never had a relationship. This doesn't mean that the two never hooked up, of course! And, Happy himself witnessed two of these

"swapping of spit" moments – in *Iron Man #63* and again in *Iron Man volume 3 #24.* Kind of like a stereotypical soap opera, eh? Come on!

Pat: So Dave, have you been secretly watching a few afternoon soaps? ;-) All joking aside, you're absolutely right. Makes you wonder how come women don't love comics any more than they do. I always liked Pepper and although their secret romance spiced up stories quite well in the early days, I'm glad they never ended up together. Pepper would simply not fit in with Tony's life style, she's too much of a Plain Jane. Every time he'd go on a mission, she'd sit home, worry and eat chocolate... she'd be weighing 400 pounds by mid-2003 at this rate! ;-) Nah, she's a fine secretary and a good friend but let's leave it at that. She's my number 5. By the way, what the heck happened to her kids?



#### **#3. RUMIKO FUJIKAWA**

Yep, that's right! I personally feel that Ru is **the most beautiful woman** Stark has ever been involved with (it certainly helps that **Sean Chen** – one of the best IM artists ever – drew her), but she also was one of the strongest in constitution. She had the guts to challenge Tony's workaholic ethic, daring him to have fun – and it even worked a few times! She initially didn't come across as the pampered daughter of the Fujikawa half of the **Stark/Fujikawa elite**, but once **Kurt Busiek** (and later Chen) left the book, Ru

descended into a "get even" adolescent type when Stark rival **Ty Stone** appeared on the scene. I'd like to see her come back, but I doubt it'll happen. (First appearance: *Iron Man volume 3 #4.*)

Pat: I disagree (it had to happen at some stage!) I hated Rumiko from the start. Sure she's gorgeous, but that's it. She could never accept Tony for who he is, she constantly had to try and change him. All she's interested in is partying, she's just an immature and annoying spoiled brat, completely unreliable and a constant source of problems and trouble. Stark needs a real woman, not a teenager brat daughter! I'm glad she's gone and if I never see her again, it'll be too soon. Ru is nowhere on my list.

#### **#4. WHITNEY FROST/MADAME MASOUE**

What stronger woman could there be than the head of a crime cartel like the Maggia, an operative of Midas, and who's the daughter of one of the "nefarious" baddies in the Marvel Universe, Count Nefaria? Such was her effect on Stark that he dropped concern of his company to virtually literally "run away" with Whitney, all the while the mischievous Midas was taking over Stark International (see Iron Man #s 103-107). It took the accidental death of her pappy, Count Nefaria, in IM #116 to pry Frost away from Tony, but her feelings hadn't seemed to wane much, as witnessed in the volume 3 Avengers' battle with the ionically super-powered new Count Nefaria. (First appearance: Tales of Suspense #98.)



Pat: Ah, yes... Whitney. None of Tony's women ever had such depth (aside maybe for Cabe once she realised her ex-husband was still alive). Masque is a tortured soul, constantly torn between her past and her present, between pride and shame, between love and hate. She is fascinating and unpredictable, her frailties and failures make her all the more human and believable. The short time she spent with Tony was unequalled in sheer passion, I don't remember Stark ever falling so hard for anyone else. I'd love to see her make a comeback. She's my number 2.

#### **#5. GRETL ANDERS**

You've all heard the phrase "Love is Blind," right? It must've been in this case, that's for sure. By far the most *un*attractive woman Tony has ever been with, Gretl nevertheless proved to imbue Tony with the

fortitude to **overcome the lowest point in his life.** As Gretl gave birth to her baby (no, Tony was *not* the father) in a raging blizzard, **she died in Tony's arms**....but the presence of the newborn forced Tony to survive the night protecting the infant (*IM #182*). This began his road upward to regaining his sobriety, sanity, and ultimately his company and life. (Gretl's first appearance: *IM #178.*)

Pat: Could it be our friend Dave has a soft spot in his heart for GretIs



and Grets in general?;-) (Good one, Pat! Pat is referring to my wife, who just happens to be named Grettel! -- Dave) I think whether Gretl was a girlfriend at all or just a friend is highly debatable to begin with. Stark was in no condition to involve himself in a relationship at the time. The way I see it, she did nothing to help Stark and only accidentally managed to do so by dying, therefore I find it hard to credit her as Stark's saviour. She just accidentally found herself in the middle of what is perhaps the most interesting Tony Stark story ever told.

Personally, I would have awarded third position to Janet Van Dyne, the winsome Wasp! The two got

involved in the pages of *Avengers* #224 and let's face it, they are one heck of a good match! Both millionaires, both super-powered heroic Avengers, both well-known public figures and both young and good looking. I personally think it's a shame it didn't work out.

My number 4 would have to be the most recent of Stark's flames: the beautiful computer hacker and martial arts expert from Sarawak that Tony met in his latest Annual (2001). Ana Wei made quite an impression on me. She's strong-willed, brilliant (and shares her passion with electronics with Tony) and can defend herself quite well! The two characters hit it off right away and Ana reacted a lot better to Tony's use of a secret identity than Calista Hancock did! Only problem is she's got a kid and I can't really imagine Tony playing dad at this point in time. Maybe I should've picked the Black Widow instead...



#### **Hube & Pat's 5 "Lamest" Stark Babes:**

#### **#1. KATHY DARE**



Who else? #### **#2. CLYTEMNESTRA ERWIN**



She merely held inside her deep *hatred* for Tony as she blamed *him*, not **Obadiah Stane**, for the death of her bro (issue **#199**). Then, to get even, she teams up with **A.I.M.** to plan Stark's death! (Revealed in **IM #216.**) Never made sense to me.... (First appearance: **IM #171.**)


Pat: I'm behind you 100% once more. What a freak! She deserved to get that A.I.M. glider right between the eyes.

#### **#3. MARIANNE RODGERS**

Ugh. Anyone who recalls those **70s issues** where she was Tony's steady squeeze may cringe. She was a clingy, seemingly dopey blonde who had **ESP (extra-sensory perception) powers.** These powers, which kept overwhelming her when **Tony/Iron Man** was in danger, eventually did just that permanently – and Stark had to put her in an

institution. She came back during the **Midas** takeover of Stark Int'l, zapping the bloated one into a vegetable (*IM #107*) – but she was aiming for Tony! She came back again during the, um, "Crossing." 'Nuff said. (First appearance: *IM #36.*)

Although they never really got romantic, why in the world was Stark chasing after this PITA (Pain In The A\*\*)?? She's the sister of IM baddie **Firebrand** (the first one) and shares his politics, albeit in a more peaceful manner. This obviously conflicted with Tony's own views, and while this may have led to some slightly mildly interesting banter in the **Vietnam-era 70s**, it is sadly dated now. It (and she) was more annoying than anything else.

Pat: I'd love to agree again, but I can't. I don't think I even have any comics with her so I really can't say I have an opinion. My number 4 would have to go to Sunset Bain. Don't get me wrong, I think she's a fascinating and cool character to have around, I wish she'd pop up more often! But as girlfriend, she was a total £@&\*!!! She tricked Tony into giving her the security codes of his father's company so she could steal his secrets and start her own business! Her possible future in the world of the Iron Man of 2020 only makes her an even more dangerous threat. Yes, she's a great character, but truly one of the absolute worst ladies Stark could have possibly gotten involved with.

#### **#5. KRIS DeGANN**
